

Soldier Artists Planning For Forthcoming Exhibit

With art projects pointing toward the forthcoming summer exhibit at the Portland Art Museum, soldier artists who have made the "Soldier-Artists Workshop" in Club 1 their headquarters after duty hours are putting finishing touches on present works and planning other works which can be completed in time for the opening the first week in July.

Among the artists who have been working almost nightly, are Morton Dimenstein of the Timber Wolf Artillery. Mort has done some solid portraits and this past weekend invited his cute wife Mimi over to the workshop. On Sunday she turned out several smart sketches as well as a water color of hubby. She has exhibited several landscapes done in the vicinity of Salem at the Russian War Relief building there.

Hank Shea is another "regular." He's also from the Artillery and has several landscapes around camp done in water color, on display in the workshop. Marvin Halye, of the Mountaineer's Band has done several portraits and landscapes in both oil and water color.

Paul Danheiser of the Post MP's is primarily a cartoonist with a genuine flair for humor which he can capture with his brushes and paints. He has a series of cartoons concerning army life, hung in the workshop. Joe Booth of the Signal Corps, occasionally, drops his Speed Graphic long enough to pick up a palette and go to town in oils. Quite naturally, he paints with a photographic touch.

These men are among Lynch's "Regulars." Of course, there are several others who stop in, intermittently, to work.

Incidentally, Lynch announced this morning that ceramics will be the next phase the workshop will enter. Materials, including clay and modeling tools have arrived and work in clay will begin shortly.

With a big-time exhibit in the offing, the incentive to work hard-

er and accomplish things has been instilled in the men of the "Soldier-Artist Workshop."
