# 'Wolf Scouts' **Survive Tests**

#### **Candidates in First Class End Three-Day** Super-Fitness Ordeal

The first class of candidates vying for assignment as "Wolf Scouts" in the Timber Wolf division, finished their three-day test late yesterday afternoon.

Today those who successfully completed the six-point qualification test await notification that they have received the coveted award.

Plans for this qualification examination, which tests the physical stamina and mental alertness of soldiers under simulated war conditions, were formulated by Brigadier General Bryant E. Moore, assistant division commander. General Moore's own war experiences have shown the need for well-trained scouts.

According to the board of judges, comprised of officers and Enlisted Personnel, the tests prove that it takes men of better than average
