Unprecedented Honor Given M-Sgt. Proctor

Never before at Camp Adair has there been a ceremony to compare with the one that will take place on the Post Parade Grounds next Monday. At that time the entire personnel of the SCU will assemble in formal retreat and pass in review in honor of M/Sgt. Joseph W. Proctor, of the 18th Engineers.

M/Sgt. Proctor is soon to complete thirty years of service in the armed forces of the country and will be further honored with a citation read by Col. Gordon H. McCoy, Post Commander, in tribute to his continuous, faithful service.

The sergeant enlisted in 1917 and is a veteran of the battles of Aisne-Marne, St. Mihiel and the Argonne. When demobilized in 1919, he immediately re-enlisted for the army of occupation and has remained in the army ever since.

Prior to fighting in the World War he had served a hitch in the U. S. Navy. He spent one year as a member of a submarine crew, and when his enlistment was up, he had attained the grade of Electrician 1st/cl.

Recently, with the 18th Engr., he worked on the construction of the Whitehorse sector of the new Alcan Highway. He was in charge of the first truck of the first convoy that made the trip from White-

horse to Fairbanks.

Before he returned to the States, his commanding officer, Lt. Col. Jacob P. Mottorn, published General Order No. 16 in his honor. It said in part:

"His devotion to duty was a great asset in the past months of road construction. He was in charge of the motor section of supply and through his efforts and initiative was able to make available repair parts and maintenance, thereby keeping motor equipment operating."

Mrs. Proctor will stand at her husband's side as he takes the review of the SCU troops.
