Camouflage Amazes

Camouflage was employed to its fullest advantage and was productive of some surprising effects. Don't Get Stuck With No-Good Money Order

Too Old Money Order Really Protects Cash

To safeguard their personal funds, Army personnel frequently purchase money orders payable to themselves. These they keep for varying lengths of time.

The Postal Officer has called attention to the fact difficulty has been encountered by some when they tried to cash these money orders because postal money order regulations were not adhered to.

The period of validity of a U.S. Postal Money Order with particular reference to the manner in which military personnel are affected is the subject of War Department Circular No. 155.

Normally, money orders are payable for a period of one year only from the last day of the month in which issued. Payment can be made at the office on which drawn, the office at which issued or at branches or stations of either.

A money order drawn in favor of the armed forces has an additional advantage. It is payable at an office other than the one on which it was drawn or the one at which it was issued for a period of

60 days. Of course, for the entire year it remains payable at the issuing office or the office it was issued against.

The expiration of the periods of validity makes necessary the issuance of a new money order. This requires correspondence, an additional fee and considerable time,

depending on the location of the holder of the money order.
