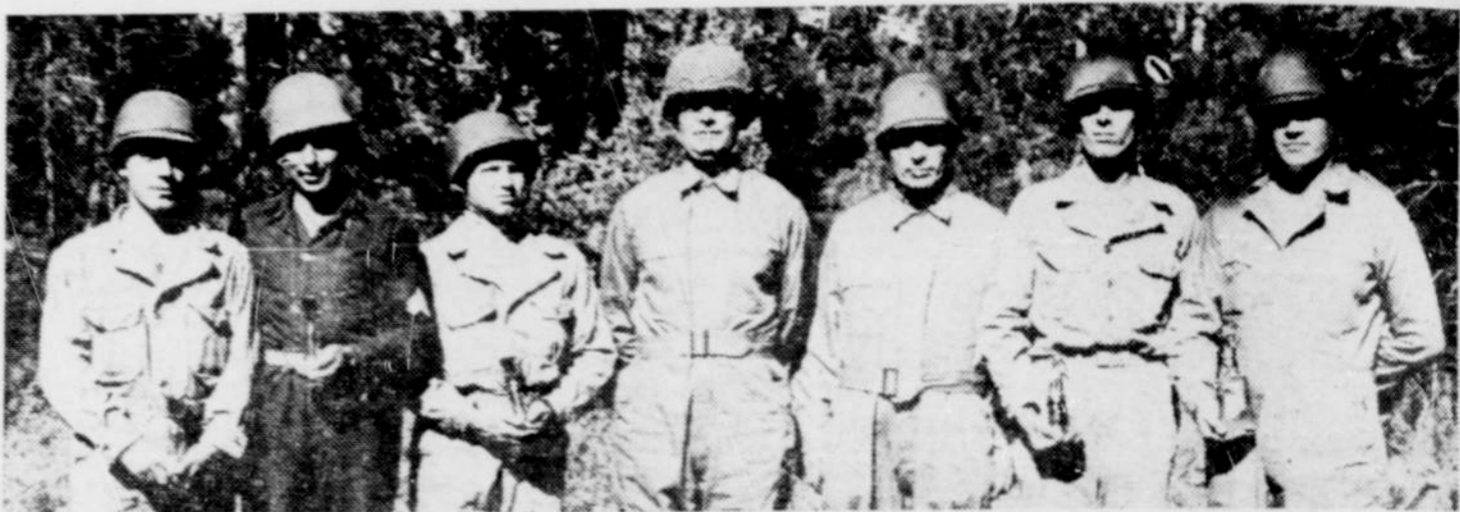

Sgt. William "Lover" Gerity started things rolling with a terrific homer over third base that never stopped until it landed inside the "men's room."

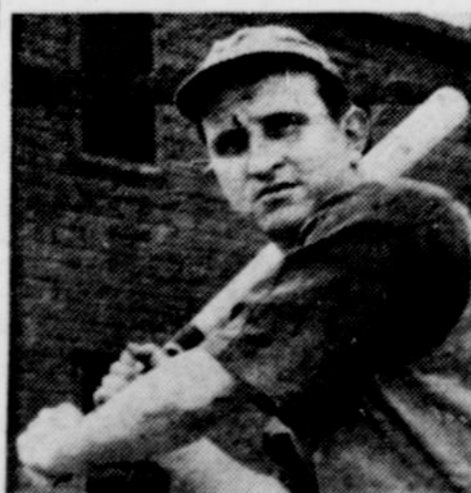
