Infantry and Artillery Combine to Put On 'Graduation Exercises'

FLIERS SHOW SKILL

Highlighted by graphic field demonstrations of infantry and artillery fire power, strafing and dive-bombing, the 96th Division held its first birthday party last Saturday and heard Major General James L. Bradley, commanding officer, pledge the might of the 96th as a "combat division," ready for active service.

General Bradley, referring to the celebration of the 96th's Activation Day as its "graduation exercises," addressed approximately 10,000 troops and several thousand civilian guests assembled in the Prune Ridge area for the program.

"We still lack one thing—the desire to kill," General Bradley said.

The three-way fire power demonstration showed the skill of the Air Force, divisional infantry and artillery.

Fighter and bomber planes of the Third Air Force demonstrated what destruction air power might cause to unprotected ground forces.

Post Bank Expected To Open Next Week

Complete Banking Services Offered

Camp Adair's bank is expected to open next week, Mr. Nelson L. Leland, the manager, announced today.

Located on Club Avenue, midway between the guest houses and adjacent to the Bus Depot, the bank building will be large enough to accommodate a well-rounded banking service, and will be easily accessible from all parts of the Post.

Under authorization of the United States Treasury Department, the agency will be operated by the United States National Bank of Portland through its Corvallis branch.

The services that the bank will offer will consist of taking deposits; issuing and cashing bank money orders, drafts, and travelers' checks; cashing of pay checks for men in the service; and selling War Bonds and War Savings Stamps.

Tentatively the banking hours have been set at 12:00 noon to 4:30
