A small fee of 40 cents is charged to cover the cost of clean linens. There is a heavy demand for the facilities, so the men are urged by USO officials to register as early as possible.

The curfew hour is midnight, and the doors are locked at that time. Sunday morning, after being refreshed with free shaves and showers, they are served coffee and doughnuts, generously donated by the American Legion Auxiliary.
