

Top Movies Booked at Theaters During Week

Topping this week's theater entertainment is the fast-moving musical show brought to Camp by the USO-Camp Shows — "Help Yourself." It will be presented tonight and tomorrow night and is absolutely free.

A star-studded musical, "Thank Your Lucky Stars," is a new feature of the movie schedule, with Ann Sheridan, Bette Davis, Olivia DeHavilland, Eddie Cantor, Errol Flynn and many other top-flight actors. Gracie Fields, popular British actress, is teamed with Monty Woolley in the highly-successful comedy, "Holy Matrimony," which is her first American picture.

Three war action pictures are "Sahara," with Humphrey Bogart — the story of an American tank crew which is detached from its command in Libya; "Submarine Alert," with Richard Arlen and Wendy Barrie; and "Watch on the Rhine," an adaptation of the successful play, starring Bette Davis and Paul Lukas.
