NO COAT OF ARMS FOR NEW GROUPS

WASHINGTON—An order issued by the War Department specifies that coats of arms will no longer be approved or authorized for organizations which bear colors or standards until such organizations have had military service upon which to base such a design.

When an organization having a coat of arms is redesignated, the War Department, on recommendation of the appropriate commander, will redesignate such design in accordance with the approved history of the organization.

The War Department has also banned the manufacture of distinctive insignia, whether of metal or plastic. This does not apply to the wearing of cloth shoulder patches.
