'Maggie's Drawers' in Spotlight as 362nd Newspaper Ends First Year

"Maggie's Drawers," veteran paper issued weekly in the 362nd Inf., is a year old this week, and while there won't be any torchlight parades or dancing in the streets to celebrate the occasion, at least there will be some pretty satisfied smiles over in the neighborhood of the 362nd.

"Maggie's Drawers" is the unofficial newspaper, dedicated to the gay red bunting which waves enthusiastically at the rifle range when one unfortunately misses the target.

As far as newspapers go, it doesn't amount to shucks. "The old girl," as she is affectionately termed by her editor, Tec5 Bernie Smith, is supposed to decorate the breeze every week.

"But something usually happens," sighs Smith, "like a 25-mile hike, a visit to the dentist, an overnight problem, or maneuver or something."

"Maggie" was launched inauspiciously one year ago when the 362nd was stoned at Camp White. At that time there was no Camp newspaper, and no publication of any kind to chronicle the events of the day.

Because there is no authorization for a regimental newspaper,

Smith had to improvise, a common practice in the Army. He had to buy, beg, borrow and steal mimeograph paper, at first paying for it out of his own pocket often as not.

He had no typewriter for eight months and had to quietly use one at Regimental Headquarters in the late evening hours. As for news, he discovered it had to be pried out with a screwdriver in most cases.

Ethics made no impression on Smith, an ex-Hearst and Scripps-Howard man. They still don't.

If he sees a good item in a national magazine, he lifts it, re-decorates it and plants it for his men to enjoy. He figures he's not going to put Colliers or Reader's Digest out of business anyway. He had the shock of his life, once, though.

"Maggie's" flagrantly copied a cartoon out of Collier's magazine one week, Editor Smith coyly explaining in another part of the paper that "if Collier's wanted to steal anything from 'Maggie's Drawers' it was all right with him."

Two weeks later, Collier's carried part of an editorial which had appeared in the little mimeographed sheet. Smith never quite got over it.

Edward G. Henig, Hq. Btry., 348th FA, Volunteered Twice; 1st-Sgt. in Two Wars

"Ours was a damn fine outfit, tops, one of the most highly-decorated outfits in the AEF. But I must say that the men of the 91st should undoubtedly do better even than we did. Their training is better; their morale is as high. They're good, and in spite of their griping, God bless 'em, they know they are good."

These are the words of 1st/Sgt. Edward G. Henig, Hq. Btry., 348th FA Bn. He volunteered for both world wars and both times has served our country as first sergeant. He saw action with the machine gun company of the 31st Infantry, 33rd Division, at Chippely and in the Argonne.

Was Lucky

"I was just lucky to come out without any wounds. The enemy was only about 50 to 100 yards away, and when we went over the top, we didn't have the weapons or equipment men have today. We had to rely on the Allies for equipment—but I don't want to talk about the past. The present is more important."

In 1942 Sgt. Henig was commander of his Legion Post at Cal-

exico, Calif., and had a fine position as customs inspector and examiner. However, just before his fiftieth birthday, he left his home and enlisted as a private.
