Best of the Week: 'Song of Russia,' 'Ali Baba,' and Story of Old West

ALI BABA AND THE FORTY THIEVES—This is a natural for technicolor, and you'll agree after seeing Bagdad in the days of the cruel Kahn, the forty thieves and Ali Baba. Universal didn't miss a trick, including filming glamorous Maria Montez in just the costumes you've been waiting for! Other players, music and photography are all top-notch.

SONG OF RUSSIA—While depicting the fight of the USSR against the Nazi invader, bulwarked by the Russians' intense love of homeland, this excellent movie nevertheless keeps the emphasis strictly on entertainment—with Robert Taylor, Susan Peters and Robert Benchley all dishing it out. The story concerns an American conductor (Taylor), his manager (Benchley) and his Russian wife (Miss Peters). The musical score, which draws heavily on Tchaikowsky, Shostakovitch and modern Russian composers, is excellent. And while you're being entertained, you'll gain a new respect for an ally.

THE WOMAN OF THE TOWN—Traced with plenty of humor, authenticity, drama, action and a touch of tragedy, this tootin', shootin' script is the story of the late "Bat" Masterson, sheriff who installed law and order in Dodge City and went on to become editor of the New York Morning Telegraph. Real story of the Old West, but NOT a typical western—roles

are expertly handled, and story is convincing.

CAREER GIRL—Though it has a weak and hackneyed story, the gaining popularity of star Frances Langford, just returned from entertaining Allied troops on the war fronts, may make this picture ring the bell.

THE LODGER—Good for the horror fans—a thriller compounded of murky London streets, shrill screams at night and a maniacal murderer, whose recurring insanity and fear carry the burden of the film. It's not built on suspense, but does achieve some chilling moments that'll make your scalp tingle!

ROOKIES IN BURMA—It's the second of the Wally Brown-Alan Carney GI comedies, with laughs, action, suspense and continuity of plot based on a story-full of punch dialogue. The jokes will leave you rolling in the aisles (it says here). Anyway, the two stars are captured by the Japs, escape in a tank and finally on a elephant before the curtain rings down.
