To See: 'The Miracle of Morgan's Creek,' One of Screen's Funniest

The Miracle of Morgan's Creek—Preston Sturges crowns his career with the maddest picture he ever made (and one of the funniest ever to hit the screen) combining standard elements of drama (straight from "East Lynne") while the audience screams with laughter. The lightheaded smalltown girl gets in trouble in the time-honored fashion of melodrama—this time with an unknown soldier—and the shy, small-town boy is called on to rescue her good name, but instead finds himself accused of forgery, bank robbery and a host of other crimes. Only a miracle could solve the story—and a miracle does. If slightly illogical, it's zany and at the same time straightforward and deftly handled. GIs will lap it up!

USO Show—Showing Off—Billed as a fast-moving revue with girls, gags and music, it has a cast of 14 performers—comedians, dancers, three singing sisters, puppeteers and roller skaters included in the

works. Will play here Monday at Theater 2 and Tuesday at No. 5, with two performances each night, 7 and 8:30 p.m. It's FREE, of course.

Spider Woman—Sherlock Holmes wins again, and fans of this popular series will find Spider Woman the best to date. It's an account of killings resembling suicides so that the woman responsible may collect life insurance payments. However, the story follows none of the time-worn grooves and manages at all times to be plausible, if not logical. It's set in London at the present time, but there's no hint of war.

The Desert Song—This old favorite gains everything and loses nothing by its second filming—this time in technicolor, with the story brought up to date (1939). The villain responsible for the mistreatment of desert tribes is now Berlin. This change was made for reasons of recent history, but none of the romance, color, fighting and melodrama of the original suffers.
