'In Our Time,' 'Broadway Rhythm,' Mystery Thriller on Post Movie List

IN OUR TIME—With the title taken from Neville Chamberlain's promise of peace after Munich and the story laid in Poland just before the war, IN OUR TIME is principally a romance. As such, it will appeal to followers (of which there are plenty) of Ida Lupino and Paul Henreid, who both turn in stellar performances. The picture does not excuse the Polish feudal regime, which in part was the cause of Polish unpreparedness. All characters are aptly handled. Musical themes from Chopin are effective.

BROADWAY RHYTHM — For musical-comedy lovers, this will ring the bell four times. It does not have the star-packed cast of recent Hollywood musicals, but George Murphy, Tommy Dorsey

and Ginny Simms all have plenty of what it takes. Specialty entertainers included in this technicolor extravaganza—Lena Horne, with two blues songs; Hazel Scott at the piano; Dean Murphy imitating Charehill, Willkie, the Roosevelts and others, and several dance numbers. Story is simple, music and production are good. See it.

PHANTOM LADY—Directed by Joan Harrison, protege and follower of Alfred Hitchcock's suspense and terror theory, PHANTOM LADY will be the dish for all thriller fans. Story concerns the search for an unknown girl to provide a murder alibi. Cast is all excellent except for Franchot Tone, more or less mis-cast as a semi-madman with twitching eyes and clenching hands.
