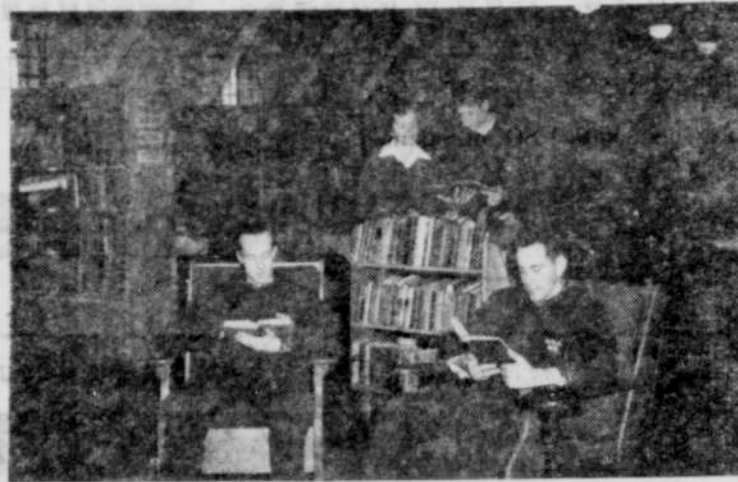

### USO Show, Two Horror Films, Good Character Studies Hit Post Theaters

LET'S GO — Latest of the USO show series, LET'S GO will hit Adair tonight at Theater 2 and tomorrow night at No. 5, with shows at 1900 and 2030, and FREE, of course. Troupe boasts an all-colored cast of top-notch entertainers with trick and rhythm dancing, "blues" singers and comedy and novelty numbers, featuring singer Myra Taylor and the three Reeves sisters, whose polished dance routines have been a hit in leading night spots. George Rowland, juggling comedian who entertained troops overseas in the last war, is included.

TENDER COMRADE—Mixture of comedy and pathos—the story of a girl whose husband goes overseas and who brings up their child alone when he is killed. A strong vehicle for its star, Ginger Rogers, but audiences may object to the theme. It's a picture by and for the women. It may be tuned to your GI taste, however.

BRIDGE OF SAN LUIS REY —The fascinating characters of Thornton Wilder's Pulitzer Prize novel of Peru two centuries ago come to the screen again in this story of the lives of five who die when a bridge collapses. Movie is a superb performance piece for a group of skilled character actors and actresses, who make the most of it. All are carefully handled, and though there is suspense and climax in the fall of the bridge, sometimes dialogue drags. Production is lavish, and it's worth your 15 cents.

**CURSE OF THE CAT PEOPLE** —Made as a horror sequel to last year's CAT PEOPLE — it falls short of that success, perhaps because the script writer faced a major obstacle in the death of the leading character of the first film. P. S. She turns into a wraith—and attractive, too. All the old tricks of light and sound are used to produce eeriness, but the story remains mostly confused.

**THE UNINVITED**—Not to be associated with the common type B horror film, this is a distinguished tale of a ghost that lingers on in the scene of its life, intent upon destruction of a child it despised. Good direction and characterizations may raise its audience appeal, which is limited. There is no humorous angle.
