### Pocket-Sized Books Distributed by ARC

Nearly 3,000,000 Find Way Overseas

Washington, D. C., March 11 — To provide American troops with much-needed diversion from wartime experiences, the American Red Cross purchased more than 2,760,000 pocket-sized books last year for free distribution to servicemen, it was announced today at American Red Cross National Headquarters.

Many of the handy-size books were put in kit bags given to troops at ports of embarkation by Red Cross workers, thereby providing the men with something to relieve the monotony of the voyage overseas, where they were made available to thousands of men.

Worn copies of the books in Red Cross libraries attest to the craving of troops for something to read, the Red Cross explained.

### Yank Prisoners May Send Emergency Cables

(ANS)—Soldiers in German prison camps and their families at home may now use Red Cross facilities to send emergency cables, it was recently announced.

The regular postal channels are open to families of prisoners but the transfer of men from temporary to permanent camps, or their removal to hospitals, often delays delivery of postal messages.

The Red Cross cables may be used only if regular mail service fails, if the prisoner has been reported wounded or seriously ill, or if an extreme emergency exists at home. Emergency cables now permitted by international agreement already average more than 2000 a month.

### Christian Science

"Matter" will be the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday.

The Golden Text will be, "Turn ye not unto idols, nor make to yourselves molten gods: I am the Lord your God" (Leviticus 19:4).

For most GIs the army brings the death-knell to their most cherished hobbies, whether it be string saving or zoot suit wearing. But for Sgt. Patrick Martowski, head-quarters 91st Division, it was just the beginning of a unique and what promises eventually to be a profitable hobby.

In the wilds and swamps of Oregon, Martowski is collecting stones, not just ordinary stones, but semi-precious stones that can be converted with a little skill and ingenuity into ring settings and bracelets and lockets.

### 400 Semi-Precious Pounds

And in the course of his eight-month hobby he has sent home no less than 400 pounds of Jasper, agate, and a dozen other semi-precious stones, from the environs of Camp White and Camp Adair.

It all started back at Camp White when Sgt. Martowski was sitting through some of those training classes—sitting on stones, thousands of them. He was intrigued by their beauty: he got interested. He studied them at the camp library and at libraries in the nearby towns, and before long he had discovered that in the gravel fill there were bright colored agates, petrified wood, obsidian and other stones that could be made into jewelry.

Martowski envisions an extensive field for the production of synthetic jewelry by the special processing of semi-precious stones. "They can duplicate almost anything," he said, "by the right heat treatment and coloring. I have already bought special abrasives, circular saws, diamond dust and enemy wheels."
