Book Review: 'German Strategy for World Conquest' at Post Libraries

Know your enemy! That is the basis of all our present military training. Only by knowing your enemy can you expect to know how to overcome him in battle.

With this all important point in mind, we recommend that you read the Library's recently arrived book, "German Strategy of World Conquest," by Derwent Whittlesby, Prof. of Geography at Harvard university. While reading "German Strategy," the world appears as a platform whereon German lecturers strut, depicting the greatness of Germany, declaiming upon its ideas as to how the world should revolve around it. He thoroughly proves, by quotations from more than 175 German authors, statesmen, military leaders, and educators, that her plans are no idle pipe dreams of conquest smoked up by pompous Nazis in dove gray uniforms, or by the Junker puppeteers of Kaiser Wilhelm. Instead, it is a constantly growing scheme extending beyond the days when the Teutonic Knights drove the Poles out of what is now East Prussia in the twelfth century.

The reader will have many of his psychological mysteries solved by this historic volume. After reading it, there need be no doubt in anyone's mind as to the necessity of grinding our diabolical enemy into the earth and of reducing the Germans to a helplessness which will not, for a thousand years, disturb the world's peace.

AAF, RAF Chalk Up New Bombing Record

(ANS)—Spilling bombs on the enemy at the rate of 80 tons an hour during the month of March, the U. S. Strategic Air Forces in Europe, along with British-based bombers of the Royal Air Force, set a new bombing record of more than 60,000 tons dropped on enemy territory in one month. Yank airmen accounted for 30,172 tons, an official headquarters summary reveals, and destroyed 1,081 enemy planes.

Carrying the air battle to the enemy on 26 days of the month, the Eighth Air Force, based in England, and the 15th, in Italy, exceeded their February record tonnage by more than 6,000 tons. February's total of 905 enemy planes destroyed was said to be considerably more than Germany's current fighter plane production.

A total of 141,525 American airmen were over the Reich or German-controlled territory in March. Enemy-held Europe was crossed 29,016 times by heavy bombers and 16,515 times by fighters. Only on five days of the month did the Luftwaffe make a serious bid to dispute Allied supremacy of European skies.

Documentation of Writings

The recent volume was not published as American propaganda, for the work is a documentation of German writings on the science of "Geopolitik." The greatest names in German military, political, and literary history are observed stating their doctrines of Prussian supremacy over Europe first, then over the world.

Quotations from Hitler, Colin Ross (American Hitlerite) flash thru the book like machine-gun bullets with flaming tracers of Whittlesby's comments illuminating the target of world domination as viewed by the Prussian Junker warlords. It is a pure German self-indictment, a self-judgment which we must appreciate and understand in order that we may successfully combat our enemy.

The 29 maps included depict various plans of conquest up to 1950, by which year Germany was to finally become established as the supreme and unapproachable power for Hitler's boasted "Thousand years."

Take God Along

Life is made up of a series of meetings and partings, comings and goings. In the Army the tempo of such activity is quickened. War forces millions of people to leave homes, loved ones, friends; to meet new friends, see new places.

'Tis frequently easier to meet new people, to explore new surroundings than it is to leave the old. But I would like to put this question to you: Have you learned how to leave?

The prophet Isaiah gave this bit of advice, as Moffatt translates it, to a people whom he was calling to leave the city of Babylon: "Nor need you hurry forth, flying like fugitives, for the Eternal goes in front of you and your rear-guard is Israel's God." I would like to place it before you as a formula for the art of leaving.

Whatever the occasion is for departing we give much thought to what we are taking with us and who is accompanying us. Surely there is no better

companion than God and no better equipment than the knowledge that He goes before, as well as follows after. With His guiding presence we can face any future, even death itself.

"So live that when thy summons comes to join
The innumerable caravan that moves
To that mysterious realm, where each shall take
His chamber in the silent halls of death
Thou go not, like the quarry slave at night,
Scourged to his dungeon, but sustained and
soothed

By an unfaltering trust, approach thy grave
Like one who wraps the drapery of his couch
About him and lies down to pleasant dreams."

God's word furnishes the formula. Christ is the pattern. In the spirit of these we can, on any occasion, say with Shakespeare, "parting is such sweet sorrow."—Chaplain L. R. Vann, Hq. 70th Infantry Division.

Ex-Adair Soldiers Win Writer Awards

A prize of \$50 in the national servicemen's playwright contest, sponsored by the National Theater Conference, has been awarded to Pfc. Jack R. Guss, 362nd Infantry, it was announced by the Conference this week in releasing names of winners in all classifications except the long plays division.

Submitting a one-act play entitled "The Double Weepers," Pfc. Guss is one of four cash prize winners in that category, which had 214 entries.

Awards in the skits and blackouts division brought a \$10 prize to Sgt. Cecil Birkkrant, with the Special Service Office of the 96th Division, formerly at Adair. Birkkrant's entry was one of 27 winners in a field of 133 entries.

Other classifications included musical comedies, long plays, radio plays and radio "spot" skits. A total of 599 manuscripts was received by the Conference, including 153 from men stationed overseas.
