Teeth are something in the Army that everybody has in common.

And there is one thing that the Army has at Camp Adair splendidly designed to take care of teeth, and that is our Post dental clinics. There are no less than three Clinics with no less than 62 chairs to serve you, when the old molars show even the faintest signs of ache or pain.

Dental Clinics of the Post are under the direction of Col. Richard B. Pool, Camp Dental Surgeon. Two of the clinics are 24-chair clinics—D-C-1 South, where Capt. R. A. Carson is Chief Clinician, and D-C-1 North under Major F. C. Montgomery. D-C-2, under Capt. Adrian Wilson, is a 14-chair clinic.

It's On Form 79

Everything about your teeth in the Army is on your Form 79, and, brother, it's complete. Here's about the way your dental life in the Army goes:

As men come in, a dental survey is made, after which there is a periodic re-check, and care is taken that the dental survey does not interfere with the training program of a soldier.

Yanks To The Yanks

You are first given a thorough oral examination. If dental work is needed, it proceeds immediately. If you need a filling, you are sent to what is known as the "operative room." Now, supposing No. 14 molar, lower left, has to be yanked out, you are taken to Surgery, and the ex-

Equipment used and the personnel who use it in the dental work on GIs at Camp Adair are tops. This is revealed in explanation from the office of Col. Richard B. Pool, Camp Dental Surgeon, that all Senior Ritter equipment is installed at Camp Adair's three clinics.

All the officer dentists are top-notch men who were either general practitioners or specialists in civilian life. All assistants are carefully trained. In the prosthetic department, especially, all assistants have undergone special school training. It is in prosthetics where bridge work, inlays and artificial dentures are made.

After this is given due time to heal, you are taken to the Prosthetic department. Here you get your GI denture; bridge, partial plate or whatever is necessary. If the extraction is severe enough, you are hospitalized and further work is done at the Station Hospital Clinic.

Applications for Gas To Be Made on Post

Ration Boards Will Not Handle Renewals

The newly-formed Camp Adair Plant Area Board has been created expressly for the purpose of processing gasoline and tire rationing applications made by all military and civilian personnel stationed here. The office of the board is located in the Rail Transportation Office, opposite Post Headquarters. Ration boards in nearby towns will no longer handle applications of persons whose claims are based on the fact that they are stationed or employed at Camp Adair.

The Post board, which met for the first time April 7, consists of Lt. Col. Eugene I. Foster, Post Executive Officer; Capt. Gilbert A. Waite, Director of Personnel; E. L. Cramblitt, Chief Civilian Personnel; Lt. M. S. Francis, 70th Div. Ass't Judge Advocate; Capt. Wesley E. Abrams, Station Hospital Registrar; and Capt. George W. Scott, Post Transportation Officer.

For convenience hospital personnel may obtain their applications from Capt. Abrams; 70th Division personnel may get theirs at the office of Lt. Francis; the Post Engineer office has a supply for its employees; and, of course, at the Rail Transportation Office.

Must Carry Full Load

Capt. Scott is most emphatic in declaring that every car must carry a full passenger load in order that the application might be favorably considered.

All renewals must be accompanied by the cover to the last Supplemental Ration issued and all applications both SUPPLEMENTAL AND RENEWALS must be accompanied by the Tire Inspection Sheet.

All Supplemental Rations must be turned in at the Rail Transportation Office—either "B" or "C"—upon termination of employment

'Morale Work' Done On Teeth of Many GIs by Post Clinic Dentists

Bad teeth can still be your undoing and bad-looking teeth are bad socially, so, whenever possible, the dentists of Camp Adair try to see that your tooth situation is well in hand.

In many cases, though a soldier lacks a couple of teeth due to causes beyond his control or otherwise, he can chew just as well. Therefore, to all intents and purposes he's still a good soldier and the Army wouldn't have to do anything about it. The Dental Clinic, however, goes ahead and does a great deal of bridge work and makes special dentures for soldiers just for what they call "morale purposes."
