Infantry 'Leg-men' Cover Battlefronts

(ANS)—The Infantry is going to have its own corps of special correspondents to dig up news on the front line battlefronts. According to Time Magazine, 14 experienced newspapermen have just been assigned to the new Ground Force News Corps. Like "leg-men" on a big city paper, these infantrymen will scout around on the frontlines for news. But instead of writing their own stories, the Infantry leg-men will transmit the information to civilian newsmen back of the lines who will then rewrite it in their own style.

Eventually every Infantry division will have at least one trained leg-man to gather the facts of battle. Since they must dig in and fight as well as gather the news, all but one of the original 14 have had actual combat training.

Ever since the early days of the war, the Marine Corps has had its own special combat correspondents. But unlike the new Infantry leg-men, the Marine correspondents do their own writing.

Japanese-Americans Face Army Induction

Washington (CNS)—Induction into the U.S. Army of loyal American citizens of Japanese descent is gradually getting under way, the War Department has announced. These Japanese-Americans previously were accepted in the Army on a voluntary basis only but now they will be drafted, according to the WD.
