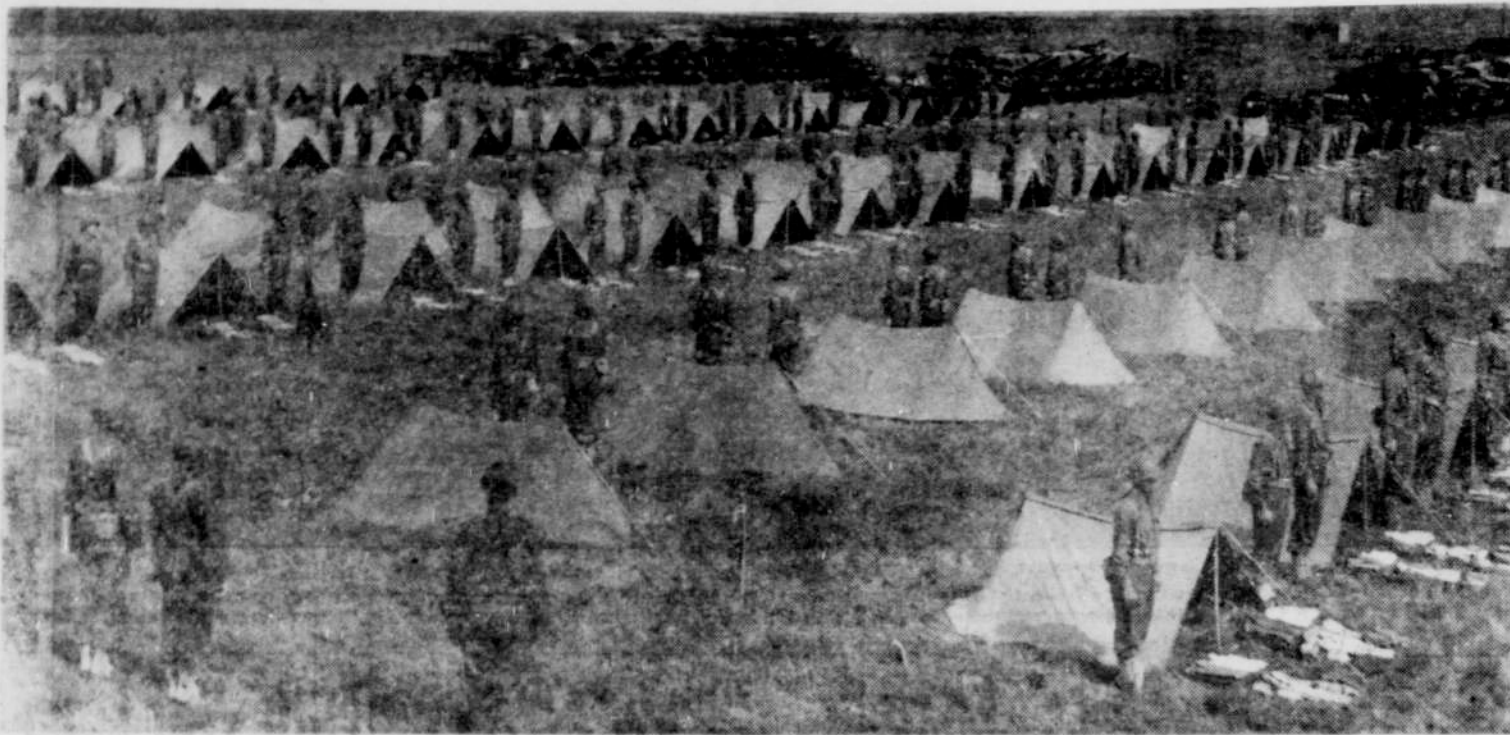

Over a cool million dollars worth of equipment was displayed by the 882nd Field Artillery Battalion Saturday morning as they set up their first formal field inspection.

Everything from field kitchens to toothbrushes, from 105 howitzers to draftsman's lettering pen was on display.

The artillery's predilection toward mathematical precision was very evident. Even the lines along which their shelter tents were pitched, their trucks parked and their guns placed were surveyed the night before by a crew under Master Sergeant Cecil D. Bolster. Transits were run to split-hair accuracy and stakes were set to true the lines.

At the far end of the field just north of the air field, the mess kitchens were set up. Then came the long lines of tents and individual full-field equipment. Beyond were trucks and other vehicles, before each of which the mechanics tools for its maintenance were laid out.

Even an airplane, one of the dozen "grasshopper" liaison planes, was lined up for inspection while its mates took off and landed from the run-way just a few yards to the west.

The intricate and costly fire control instruments were grouped together as was the multitudinous signal equipment. Artillery relied on so much.

Last were the guns themselves cleaned to new-penny brightness.

Lt. Col. Elmer B. Arnbrecht, battalion commander, personally viewed the entire display, which took almost three hours to complete. He was assisted by officers of the 770th Ordnance and 570th Signal.
