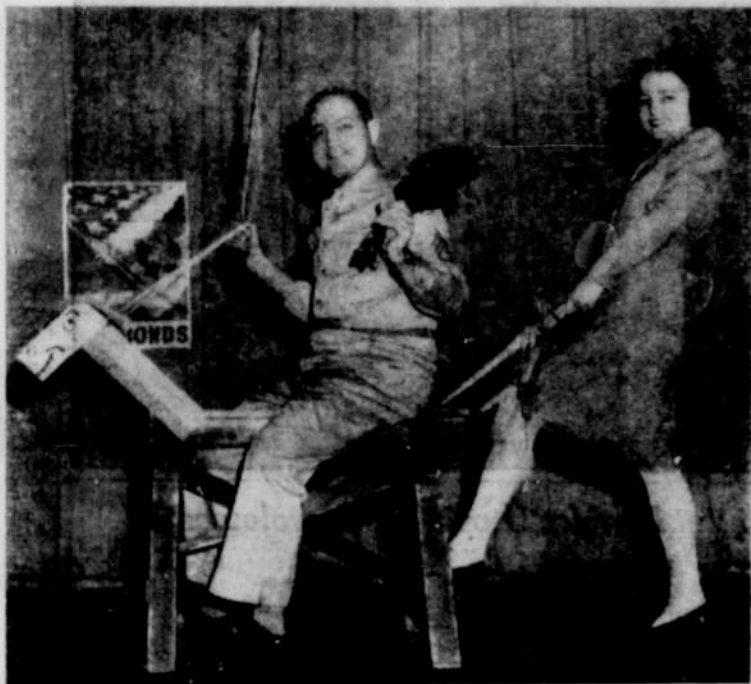


Guadalcanal Vet Weds California Lass
