Lt. Gordon E. Patton, War Bond Officer of the 70th Division, reports that GIs in the 70th have gone over their weekly quota of \$75,000 by a margin of \$87.90. The 274th Inf. leads with a total of \$24,786.75, with the 275th coming up with a total of \$15,165.45. Lt. Patton reports two large purchases being made by Cpl. Dan B. Cohen of 2nd Bn., 274th and S/Sgt. John E. Singleton also of the 274th. Cpl. Cohen purchased 14 bonds totaling \$13,500 and S/Sgt. Singleton purchased two bonds at \$450 purchase price.

Plan 12 Bond at \$7.50

Large bond deductions under Plan 12 authorized by WD Cir. 237 are expected of EM and officers as the GI bond seems fitted to their earnings best. This bond, authorized as of June 1 can be purchased only by servicemen and women both officers and EM and is purchased by the payroll deduction plan, only. GI bonds are sold at \$7.50 and may not be deducted in partial payments.

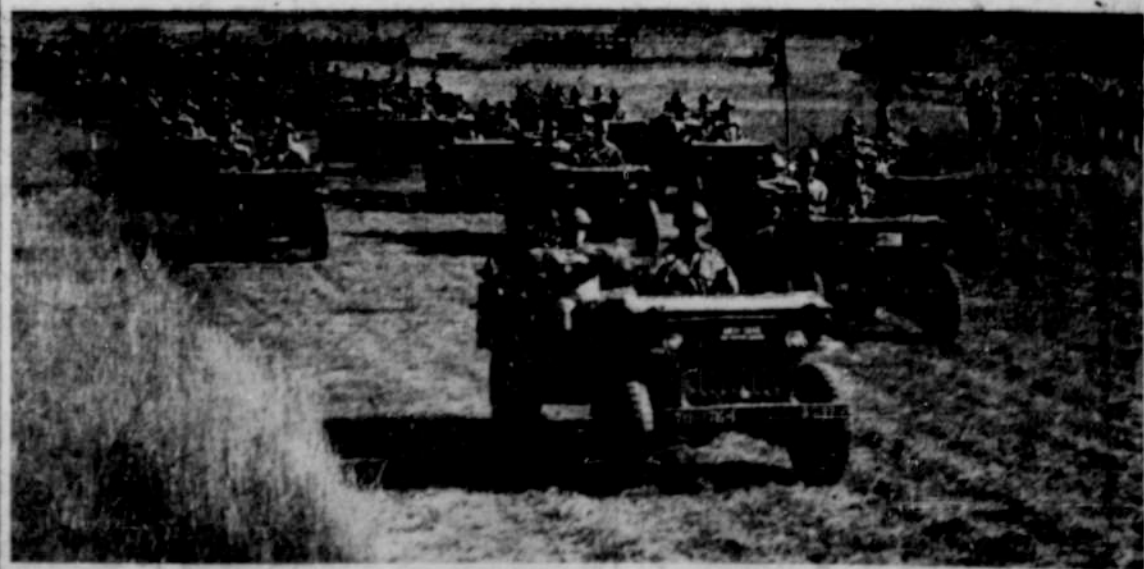
Lt. Colonel J. L. Richardson, the new commander of the 275th Regiment, led the review.
