Souvenir of the semi-centennial meeting of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers' association held at LaGrande June 17, 18, 19, 1937

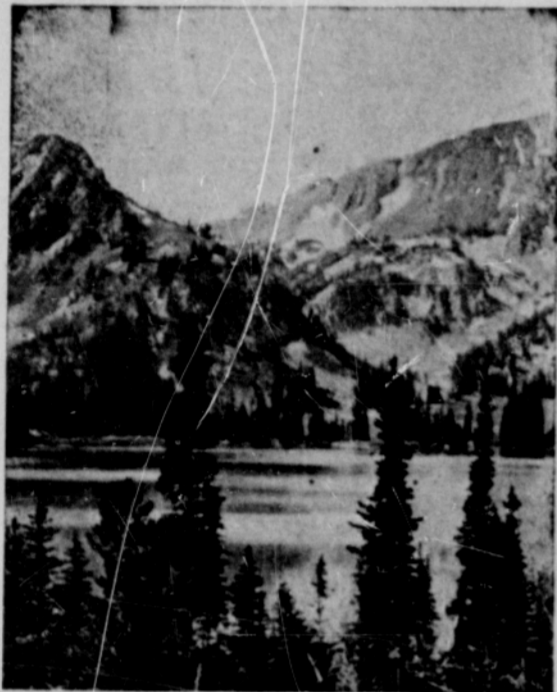
The Record Chieftain

From the first paper, the Chieftain has never missed an issue. After the county seat was established at Enterprise the Chieftain moved to that city where it has been published ever since.



Main Street, Enterprise

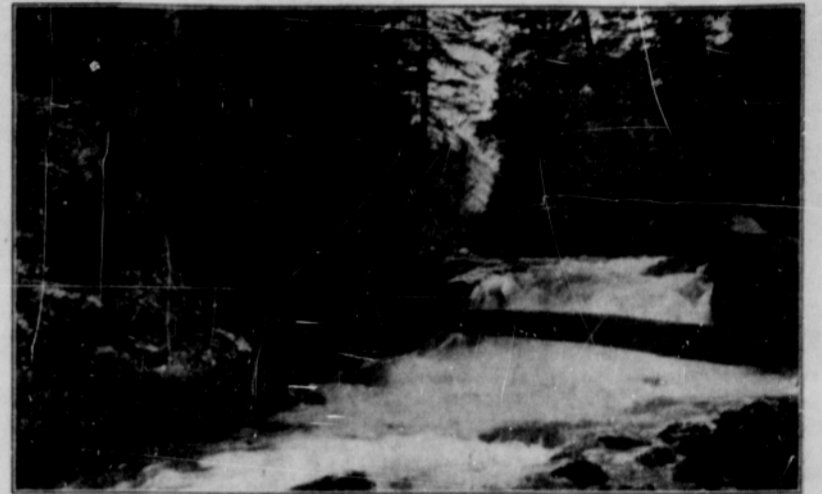
At the left is shown Main street of Enterprise. The town was established in 1887 on Bennett flat, where the horses used to come out of the hills for water in midsummer. After the usual fight, it became the county seat and is today the center of the county's business and administrative life. It is the hub from which roads radiate to all parts of the county and to points beyond.

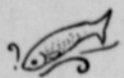
