#### RESOLUTIONS PASSED.

At the Anti-Toll Road Meeting at Joseph last Saturday.

At the Joseph anti-toll road meeting last Saturday S. A. Heckertorn was called to the chair and E. L. Harris was elected secretary. J. H. Cochran, W. A. McCully and A. W. Gowan were appointed a committee to draft resolutions praying the County Court to begin action against the incorporators of the Wallowa Canyon Toll Road Company, and stating the people's grievances. The resolutions were drafted and after able speeches by Messrs Cochran and Gowan, were unanimously adopted by the meeting. They are as follows:

Whereas there is now being an effort made by J. H. Smith, et al, to rob the people of the Wallowa Valley of the only avenue of egress and ingress out of and into said valley.

Whereas, the said parties are attempting to seize upon the road that our people have through long years of toil, exposure and hardships constructed, at a cost of many thousands of dollars.

Therefore be it Resolved, First: That we the people of the Wallowa Valley do hereby appeal to the Hon. County Court of Union county with confidence that you, the said Court, will take all necessary legal steps against this wrongful attempt to usurp and appropriate the wagon road through the Wallowa Canyon by the above named parties as we do candidly believe the same to be a legal county road.

Resolue, second: That we, the whole people of the Wallowa Valley, do solemnly pledge ourselves each to the other that we will resist to the last extremity every such attempt against our rights, resorting to any and all means necessary to defeat this most outrageous robbery.

Resolue, third: That it is the belief of the people of Wallowa that the proposition of the incorporators of the "Wallowa Toll Road" to charge only 25cts per two horse wagon, is only a mischievous and deceitful device intended to quiet the people while the incorporators perfect their dishonest scheme of robbery.

Resolue, fourth: That the people of Wallowa have no confidence in either the honesty or veracity of any men, or set of men, who would claim under and by virtue of incorporation papers the right to construct a toll road and immediately after filing the said papers attempt to steal a road constructed by the people of Wallowa seven or eight years since and used by them during the whole of said period.

Resolue, fifth: That we have no objection to the incorporators of the "Wallowa Canyon Toll Road" constructing and operating a toll road through the Wallowa Canyon but we do and will, both now and forever, object to their stealing a road which we have already constructed.

Resolue, sixth: That we the people of Wallowa do hereby most solemnly and sincerely pledge and obligate ourselves each to the other and the whole of us as one man, that no man, or set of men, shall now or ever seize upon, obstruct, or annoy our people, by erecting a toll gate and placing it across the Wallowa Canyon road which we have built, and which belongs to us and Union county. And we do hereby solemnly warn said corporation, and all other persons, from attempting any act so infamous against our people.

Resolue, seventh: That the secretary be instructed to send a copy of these Resolutions to the CHIEFTAIN and a copy to each of the Grande Ronde papers, together with the proceedings of this meeting.
