THE THIRD REGIMENT IN CAMP.

Nine Companies, 450 Men. In Camp Chenoweth—The Routine of Duty.

The Third Regiment O. N. G. went into camp here Monday afternoon on the grounds of Mr. Irvine, about two miles west of town. The encampment grounds are fine, being a freshly mown meadow, and the city of tents with its regular streets and blocks, is as pretty as possible, though the present warm spell is causing the soldier boys to think they are in active service.

Adjutant General Schoefner arrived on the train at 3 o'clock this morning, remaining with the regiment all day. There are nine companies in camp, and number about 450 officers and men.

ARCADIA, July 6, 1891.

The Fourth passed off quietly in this part of the county. Our patriotism was of the usual size and quality and adapted itself to the surroundings. The day was fine, and was enjoyed in a sociable manner.

Everything growing, and giving promise of an abundant harvest, grain in the field, bunch-grass on the range and huckleberries further on amongst the hills in the timber.

We have been too busy to whistle sticks, trade horses, talk tariff, or denounce "grinding monopolies," have scarcely had time to sympathize with the "downtrodden masses" groaning beneath the heel of oppression.

We noticed a communication in your Enterprise contemporary complaining that the arguments of our alliance brethren were met only with ridicule instead of manly and logical answers. Now, we think a statement that is incorrect in itself cannot be answered in a clear and concise manner otherwise than in school boy style, "You are a liar!" "You are another!"

In demanding the repeal of the National Banking Act it is not too much to expect the parties to know what that act is in all of its intricate features, but it is quite certain that nine-tenths of those demanding its repeal do not know, only from comments made by political organs. As to "fiat money," if the government stamp creates the value, why limit the mints to the coinage of silver? Iron or any other metal would do equally as well, with the advantage that farmers could send their old plow irons to the mint to be turned out as "dollars." Free coinage of silver would undoubtedly benefit silver producers and those able to purchase bullion, but not the great mass of the people. In fact, it would create one of the worst monopolies of any age or nation. Regarding the amount of the circulating medium per capita, some alliance organs put it at \$4.97 per capita; the officials of the U. S. treasury put it at \$24 per capita. Here is a great difference, and we must accept the official statement, our brethren to the contrary notwithstanding. Twelve months will elapse before the presidential campaign, and that is too long a period for a paper platform to exist unsupported by fact and experience. We need less theory and more brains in public affairs. As and more precedents in history, there is no lack of precedents for any monstrosity or absurdity. Truly there is nothing new under the sun. In a civilized nation, with progressive people the government governs, not treating the people as "wards," and providing "railroads and blankets." Each individual preserves his personal autonomy, and works out his own destiny. Without a due recognition of these principles all government would be a failure, and society impossible.

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The world's inventors are taxing their ingenuity in the direction of perfecting deadly engines of war. The magazine rifle, smokeless powder, long range cannon and every device for hurling mortars into space which human skill can suggest. A French surgeon now proposes to furnish infantry with rubber heeled shoes in order that they may be less fatigued by long marches. If a like amount of skill and energy were expended upon efforts to preserve peace and bring the nations of the world up to the standard of viewing war as a hideous crime, our boasted wisdom would not be vain. Let us emblazon, in letters of gold, on our standards the words of the world's greatest warrior: "Let us have peace."

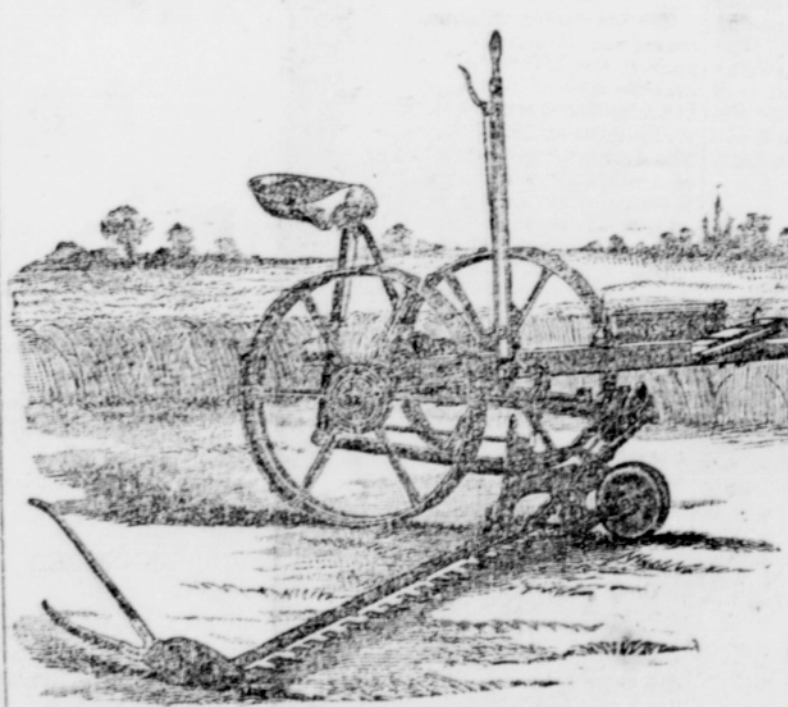
