## MR. WEAVER IS CONFIDENT.

The Republican Party is Eliminated From the Fight.

PORTLAND Or., Aug. 13.—Gen. James B. Weaver, the People's party nominee for president, arrived here yesterday, accompanied by a small party consisting of Mrs. Weaver, Mrs. Lease, V. O. Strickler and C. O. Strickler representing the national committee, Mrs. Strickler and C. A. Powers, of Terra Haute, Ind. The party took rooms at the Holton House, where temporary headquarters were opened in parlor No. 11.

When the general arrived, he was met by a large number of the People's party adherents, who thronged the headquarters till lunch hour. During that time, a general conference was held between the general and his Oregon managers, who informed him that this state would send People's party men to the electoral college beyond any doubt.

"I am sure of election," said General Weaver to a reporter, "and I will be elected, too, right in the electoral college. I do not think the election can possibly be thrown into the house. During the past two weeks a wonderful change has taken place in the political situation of this country. By virtue of this change, the Republican party has been eliminated from the race. That party stands not a shadow of a chance for success. The Homestead matter has caused a study of Republican principles and methods. Therefore, the battle lies between the People's party and the Democrats, and the former has every advantage.

"We will carry the solid South. We can do that easier than the Democrats can carry a single Southern state. The people of the South are taken with the Omaha platform. It suits them. The elimination of the Republicans has emancipated the South, and the colored and white people alike will vote their choice of tickets. We will carry the entire West solid. Our party will get the entire silver vote, since there is no choice on that line between Cleveland and Harrison. The Republicans lost nine states in 1890 which they held two years before. To win they must regain those states and carry all the silver states, and this they cannot do.

## Hunger and Starvation.

HAVANNA, Texas, Aug. 14.—Suffering among the laboring class of the Mexican population on both sides of the Rio Grande is appalling. Many families have been living for days on cactus plant and mesquite beans, and many children have died from fever and biliousness. The relief committee issues barely enough corn to keep life in their emaciated bodies. A good rainfall has within the last week swollen the river so that it is in many places over its banks, but the water comes too late to be available for this year's crops.

## Portland Newsboys Strike.

PORTLAND, Aug. 16.—This morning the newsboys inaugurated a strike against the Oregonian, which they refused to take out at the old price. At nine o'clock about one hundred followed in line and marched through the streets carrying flags and transparencies. Several attempts were made to start out boys with papers, but they were overtaken by the strikers who took their papers from them and destroyed them. The boys have been paying three cents for the paper, and they demand a reduction of one-half a cent.

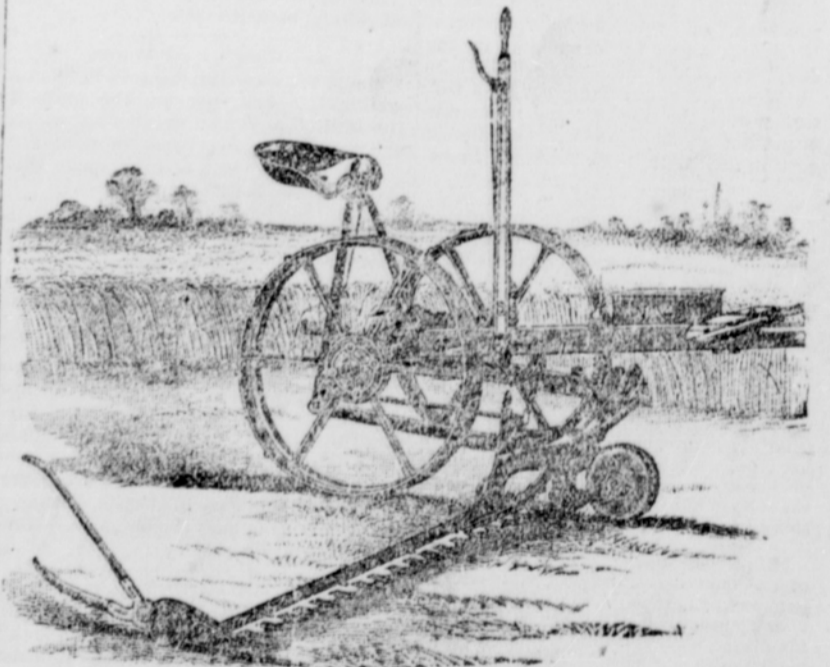
