McKINLEY AND HOBART!

SOLID SOUTH BROKEN.

Returns Indicate the Largest Popular Majority Ever Received by a President.

Arrangements were made with the Telephone Co. to receive the election returns as soon as received at La Grande and shortly before the polls closed here the news flashed over the wire that Rochester N. Y. had given McKinley 6,000 majority. Republicans were jubilant and anxiously awaited the returns as they were received at intervals, every time indicating large and constant gains and majorities for McKinley. Before midnight enough had been received to assure his election.

Up to this time no official counts have been received but very close approximations have been received. So far Oregon is safe by from 3,500 to 4,000; and California as returns indicate will give McKinley a majority of from 10,000 to 12,000.

The following is a list of the states certain for McKinley: Cal., Conn., Del., Ill., Ind., Iowa, Minn., M. I., Mass., Mich., Me., N. H., N. Y., N. J., N. Dak., Ohio, Or., Penn., R. I., S. Dak., Va., W. Va., Wis. and Ky. The following are very close: N. C., Wash., Wyo., Kan., Neb. and Texas, and the remaining states are certain for Bryan.

Later returns show that McKinley has received the largest popular vote ever received by a president and the number of his electoral votes will almost, if not more than reach 300. Pennsylvania gave him 300,000 majority, New York, 269,000, Ohio, 53,000 Kentucky, 15,000.

The official vote will probably reduce or increase these results but they are just as received from the Telegraph at La Grande.

Union county gave Bryan, according to latest returns, 400 majority.

Definite results and official counts will be given next week.

THE RALLY AT LAGRANDE.

One week ago today, a party consisting of Fred McGully, Roy Miller, Frank Cowley, Don Gardner, Anson Polley, and Carl Roe left Enterprise at 5 o'clock in the evening enroute to La Grande to attend the Republican rally of Saturday. They drove to the bridge at 11:30 Friday evening and stayed all night, completing the drive to Elgin by 10 o'clock Saturday, where a special train left for La Grande at 1:30. The trip through the canyon and on to Elgin was not altogether pleasant on account of the prevailing rain. La Grande was brimming over with people from all parts of the county and at 2 o'clock the parade of decorated wagons containing members of La Grande's fair sons and daughters, farming machinery, implements used in the lumber industry etc. and many other novelties, making altogether a parade of over a half mile long. After marching through the principal streets every one retired to the enclosure around the band stand where Holt T. Porter, of Ohio, and Judge Caples, of Portland, presented the political issues for an hour and thirty minutes. But the grandest and most impressive event of the day was the torch-light procession in the evening which extended about three-quarters of a mile up and down the principal streets. At 8:30 the crowd assembled in the opera house where they were again addressed by Mr. Porter and Judge Caples. The party from Wallowa county took the 11 p. m. train to Elgin where they stayed overnight and came on home the next day making the round trip in about 50 hours.
