The New Tax Law.

Section 14 of the tax law passed by the legislature of 1901 is as follows:

"Taxes legally levied and charged in any year may be paid on or before the first Monday of April following and if not so paid they shall become delinquent, provided, however, that if one-half of the taxes against any particular parcel of real property, or the taxes on personal property charged against any individual, be paid on or before the said first Monday in April, then the time for the payment of the remainder of such tax may be extended to and including the first Monday of October next following, but if the remaining one-half of such tax be not paid on or before the first Monday of October, then such remaining half shall be delinquent, and, besides the penalty, interest thereon shall be charged and collected at the rate of twelve per centum per annum from the first Monday of April preceding, and upon all delinquent taxes there shall be collected from the taxpayer of such taxes, for the benefit of the county, ten per centum as a penalty, and for the benefit of the county or other public corporation which shall have an interest in any portion of such taxes, interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum on such taxes from the day on which they become delinquent until their payment, provided further that there be an allowance of three per centum rebate upon any tax paid on or before the first Monday of April, next prior to the date when such tax would become delinquent if not paid."
