### Recent Strikes at Innaha.

E. G. Vaughn, of Salmon river, who is in the city reports that a number of important strikes have recently been

made at the group of mines now being developed at Innaha by the Fargo company. Reports have reached Salmon river that the ledge on the Last Chance has widened to 17 feet, the showing being a remarkable one. A rich exposure has also been made on the Governor Geer claim, one of the properties of the bonded group. The Last Chance has been improving gradually as greater depth has been obtained, and the showing at the mine it is now reported exceeds that of any property in the entire Snake river region.—Lewiston Tribune.

### NEW SMELTER COMPANY

Company has been Organized with Capital of \$2,000,000.

A company has been organized with a capital of \$2,000,000 for the purpose of erecting a smelter at some point on the upper Saake river to reduce the copper ores of that district. For some time past reports have been in circulation regarding the project, but no definite action in the matter became public until a few days ago when articles of incorporation for the Eureka Mining, Smelting & Power Company were filed at the county auditor's office in Asotin county. These articles showed the directors to be H. G. Johnson and G. A. Nehrhood, of Waukon, Iowa; C. O. Howard and M. S. Howard, of Omaha; Wm. J. Wilkinson, of Sterling, Illinois; J. T. Miller, of Chicago; O. E. Guernsey, of Dubuque, Iowa; J. E. Hubbard, of Lansing, Mich.; H. M. Peterson, of Fargo, N. D. and L. D. Lively, of Lewiston.

When seen yesterday and questioned regarding the plans of the smelter company, Mr. Lively said: "The smelter project is indirectly, or it might be said, directly the result of the operations of the Fargo Company in the Snake river copper belt. The copper company is composed of capitalists and well known smelter men, and the organization of the company has resulted after a personal investigation of the belt made by them last November. The immediate plans provide for the installation of an electric smelter with a capacity of 200 tons daily, but the large capitalization of the company has been made with a view of increasing the plant to such capacity as may be demanded. I can not at this time speak definitely as to the location of the smelter. It, however, will be located at some point between the mouth of the Grande Ronde river and Innaha. The providing of transportation facilities by water will be a necessary preliminary step in our plans, and we expect to have that feature provided within three months."—Lewiston Tribune.
