THE REPUBLICAN APPORTIONMENT.

Congressional Convention Will be Held First—State Convention the next day in the City of Portland—Wallowa gets 5 Delegates.

The republican state central committee held two meetings recently in Portland. The committeemen of the second congressional district also met. The object of the meetings was to determine the representation each county should have at the state convention and the congressional convention.

The basis chosen was 150 votes for McKinley in November 1900, and one delegate at large for each county. One delegate will be allowed for every 150 votes cast. The total number in the convention will be 398. The total number for Eastern Oregon's 15 counties will be 97. Umatilla county will have 13 and Multnomah 67.

The congressional convention will be held April 1. The state convention will take place April 2, the day after. The same apportionment was adopted for the congressional convention as for the state convention. Following are the number of delegates from

each county in the state, allowing a delegate to 150 votes and each fraction over 75:
