County Expenses.

Secretary of State F. I. Dunbar has completed the compilation of the statement of the expenses of the several counties of this state, for running the county government, and has tabulated the same and issued it in printed form. The statement contains in detail the expenditures on every account by each county, added to which is a table showing the population according to the United States census of 1900; the number of acres in each county; the assessed valuation in 1901; the percentage of expenses which each county bears to the total expense of all counties of the state; and the percentage of the appointment of state taxes among the several counties of the state. The total expense for the year 1901, except for roads and highways, in the several counties of the state, is as follows, the assessed valuation for 1901 being shown in the second column:


