Rev. T. DeWitt Talmage the noted Presbyterian clergyman, died at his home in Washington City, Saturday evening.

Congress has passed a bill granting Mrs. McKinley a pension of \$5000 per year.

Cecil Rhodes was worth \$75,000,000. He lived to be about 49 years old, but there is no doubt to him it seemed nearer a century than half of it.

The editor of the Manila Freedom is now in the toils of the law on a charge of sedition. It is claimed that the paper is devoted to the undoing of the work of the United States in the Philippine Islands.

It has been whispered that there promises to be some surprises when the experts on the county records make their final report. The exact condition of the county's finances is given in a statement in another column.

Of the fifty-one fire insurance companies that have a million or more dollars assets, only eight did business at a profit the past year which was \$521,543. The other 43 companies lost \$8,280,023, leaving a net loss of \$7,858,510 on the year's business. The total fire losses during the year equals \$93,083,000.

"Everybody for himself and the devil take the hindmost" seems to be the motto of mossbackism. There is hardly a community where this type of citizenship is unknown. A man lives in the town to get and not to give. He is weighing his privileges with pounds and his obligations with ounces. PULLMAN ORDINARY SLEEPERS.

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Company has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and doing "light housekeeping," and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths, keep the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passenger. In each of the trains which a detached daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers." The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.

Much of the first class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.
