Gov. Geet for Senator. TIMBER LAND, ACT JUNE 3, 1878. NOTICE FOR PUBLICATION.

For the first time in the history of the state, the nomination of a candidate for United States senator, made by individual electors, has been filed in the office of secretary of State F. I. Dunbar. It consists of a dozen petitions, coming from as many counties, bearing in the aggregate 2500 names of the electors of the state, and asking in accordance with the Mays act of the last legislature, that the name of Hon. T. T. Geet, the present governor of Oregon, be placed upon the official ballot as a candidate for United States senator.

The major portion of the signatures were secured in the counties of Clatskanie, Douglas, Gilliam, Jackson, Linn, Polk, Marion, Multnomah, Union, Wheeler, Wasco and Yamhill. Among the petitions was one circulated in Spring valley Polk county, where every Republican voter and several Democrats signed the petition.

The law under which the petition was filed, the Mays act, was introduced by State Senator F. P. Mays, of Portland, and was known as Senate Bill No. 1. The language of the act is as follows:

"At the general elections next preceding the election of a senator in congress by the legislature of Oregon, there shall be placed upon the official ballot by each of the county clerks and clerks of the county court the names of all candidates for the office of senator in congress that have been nominated in any of the methods now, or which may hereafter be provided by law for the nomination of state officers of the state of Oregon, the votes for which candidates shall be counted and certified to, by the election judges in the same manner as the votes for other candidates; and record of the vote shall be made out and sworn to by the board of canvassers of such county and state and returned to the secretary of state, who shall transmit duplicate copies of such returns to the legislative assembly at its next ensuing session, one of which shall be delivered by him to the president of the senate and the other to the speaker of the house of representatives, after the organization of each body, which officers shall open and lay the same before the separate houses when assembled to elect a senator in congress; and it shall be the duty of each house to count the votes and announce the candidate for senator having the highest number, and thereupon the house shall proceed to the election of a senator as required by the act of congress and the constitution of this state."—Ex.

PULLMAN ORDINARY SLEEPERS.

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Company has issued from its shops what is technically called the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan but not furnished with the same degrees. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and dining "light housekeeping" and each section is fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths, see the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passenger. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers." The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a smaller car at St. Louis.
