A farmer southeast of Almira, saw a man with law. two horses and two rifles, passing his place in a southeasterly direction early this morning. Sheriff De Bolt, ment. of Douglas county, arrived in Almira shortly before noon today, and on hearing the story left for the Perkins ranch. He has not been seen since. Almira from Wilson Creek, via Coulee ology, City, late tonight.

The fact that Sheriff De Bolt has not been heard from leads him to believe that he is hot on the trial. Cudihee left for the Perkins ranch with a team late tonight. Cudihee firmly believes that Tracy passed through Coulee City about 11:30 last night. A man riding one horse, with a packborse following, rode up the main street of that town and was seen by several residents.
