Senators to Visit Hawaii.

August 26 Senators Mitchell, of Oregon, Burton, of Kansas, Foster, of Washington and Blackburn, of Kentucky, are going on a Summer junket to the Hawaiian Islands. It is a trip of investigation. A peculiar Washington correspondent says the grave and revered gentlemen are intent upon investigating the hula-hula dance, but that is not officially confirmed.

The party of Senators are to sail on the City of Pekin on the 26th, and they will be absent in the islands about a month. Their purpose, being members of the committee on Pacific Islands and Porto Rico, is to study irrigation problems, crown lands and harbor improvements. The four members of the Upper House opine that information is too scanty on several points that come up in the round of National legislation. The elastic "contingent fund of the Senate" is to be drawn upon to pay the bill. When the House committee on a similar mission visited the islands a few years ago it was said to have been different. The members of the Lower House dropped some dignity overboard when the steamer quit the Golden Gate and the dignity was not found again.

Down in the atolls of the Kanakas the Representatives lived merrily. Joe Cannon and Berry were on that committee.

They lived like Hawaiians, squatted about a calabash and scooped up the succulent poi with their fingers, wore leis about their manly shoulders and more leis around their shoulders, and learned to say "aloha" at meeting, parting and between times, says Washington correspondent. So is the history of the junket record that was about the extent of the investigation made by the House committee.

PULLMAN ORDINARY SLEEPERS.

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Company has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers." The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.
