Edward VII Crowned King.

LONDON, Aug. 9.—King Edward and Queen Alexandra were crowned in Westminster Abbey, shortly after noon today. Though the ceremony was bereft of some of the elaboration and pageantry originally contemplated it lacked little in the way of spectacular perfection. The whole ceremonial was of a magnificently decorative character, and presented a constantly changing panorama, round the two central figures enthroned in their robes of velvet, ermine and cloth of gold, amidst the distinguished assemblage of actors, the fulfillment of whose various roles necessitated constant movement.

Each stage of the ceremony, with its Old World usages, furnished its quota of interest, while the interior of the noble church, filled as it was with officials in various capacities, with Princes and diplomatic officers in gold-laced uniforms, with heralds, pursuivants and other officers of state in medieval costumes, with peers and peeresses in rich robes, with Oriental potentates in many-hued raiment, with men of all types and all shades of complexion from different points of the new-crowned monarch's empire, with its dazzling display of jewels and wealth of color, presented a picture which, in its combined brilliancy and distinction, has seldom been excelled.

Tracy Dead.

The escaped convict and murderer of eight persons, Harry Tracy, killed himself last Wednesday night in a wheat field near Odessa, Washington. He had been pursued and shot by a posse the evening before and evidently was slowly bleeding to death when he sent a bullet crashing through his brain. When shot in the leg he crawled into the wheat field and as it was just dark the posse surrounded the field and waited until morning. An advance was made at daylight the next morning when his lifeless body was discovered near the point he entered the field. His leg was broken below the knee and a severe flesh wound was made by another bullet in the thigh of the same leg, from which he would soon have bled to death. The posse was composed of five men who will evidently share the reward. The farmer, Eddy, with whom Tracy had been staying for a day and a boy who informed the officers will also probably receive a part of the reward.

Raised a Five-Legged Mare.

William Endersby, who lives at Cherryville, in Clackamas County, has a five-legged mare, which he raised from a colt. It is a freak of nature which attracts much attention. The fifth leg and hoof is attached to the right front fore foot. About midway between the knee and ankle there is a limb, and from here the leg starts out from the main leg. The false leg is only about six inches in length and terminates in a well-formed hoof about three inches across. The hoof is on the inside of the leg.

Mr. Endersby first noticed this peculiar formation shortly after the colt was born, and came to the conclusion that the animal might be of no value. However, the mare grew to be a fine beautiful black animal, and full of activity. Contrary to expectations Mr. Endersby says that the fifth hoof does not interfere in the least, and the mare can work in harness or under the saddle.—Oregonian.
