How much do these department stores give toward keeping up the highways and sidewalks in the town or paying the minister's salary? When you were sick how many nights did some one in the mail order house sit up with you? When your loved one was buried the home merchant uttered the cheering word and not some foreign dealer.

"Who helps pay the taxes in your town and is always ready to help in any legitimate undertaking? Is it a department store or is it your home merchant? Of course it is your home merchant who does these things, and you can get just as low prices with them as in the city. Besides they are here to right any wrong."
