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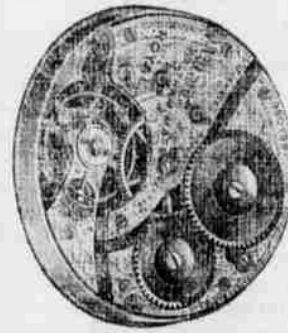

Mr. Hamilton, manager of the Eureka mine, was up from Lower Imnaha recently.

J. A. Denny, wife and baby spent a few days at Chas. Denny's last week. Mrs. Bell and Miss Susie Warden attended to the store and postoffice during their absence.

Mrs. Snell has been on the sick list, but at this writing is improving.

C. W. Ricketts and wife, who have been visiting their aunt, Mrs. B. E. Smith, left for outside points recently.

The wind that accompanied the heavy rain storm blew off a great deal of partially ripe fruit.

The road from Chas. Crumley's place on up the river for some miles is very much in need of being worked.

A man by name of Arthur O. Rose, who passed here last week stated that he lost a complete prospecting and camp outfit and a 20-foot boat on Snake river near Squaw creek about the first of August.

Tomatoes are ripe, cabbage is large enough to use and roasting ears will soon be on the market.

FRUITA.

V. O. Wilson, a pioneer of upper Prairie Creek, died at his home in Eagle Valley recently. One by one they go, these old pioneers. After the lapse of a few more years they will live only on the pages of history and but few of them there. Little did I dream a few weeks ago while writing in a vein of levity of my friend, Lewis Neal, that he was so near that rest—that sleep from which none ever awake. I could say much of this good man, but others have written who are more capable than I, I will refrain.

The long, hot, dry spell of weather was broken last Thursday evening, by one of the hardest downpours of rain I ever beheld. It lasted about five minutes during which time no less than an inch and a half of water fell.

James Wisener has leased his Freeze-out sawmill to Harry Hope. This mill and the Grouse Creek mill are relieving a distress long felt by the settlers of the Upper Imnaha. Already we feel and see how valuable these pioneer mills are to us. Rat Blevans has the lumber nearly all on the ground for a two story 18x24 foot residence.

The fiat has gone forth that the old log cabins must go. We hate to see them go, these old log cabins, for in them many of our children were born and about them cling as clings the ivy to the riven oak, the fondest, sweetest recollections of our lives.

A Mistake.

Sad Accident.

Word was received Sunday that Frank Kirkland, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. P. Kirkland, who live on the Creighton place, was drowned Saturday afternoon in the Willamette river near Eugene. He was assisting in driving logs down the river. Further particulars are not obtainable at present. The body was embalmed and shipped to this city for burial arriving here Wednesday morning in charge of J. H. Dobbin. The funeral took place from the Christian church in this city Aug. 20 at 2 p. m. The funeral sermon was delivered in an impressive manner by Rev. L. Green. The burial was conducted by the Joseph Camp of Woodmen of the World assisted by the Enterprise camp. The deceased being a member of that order at Springfield, Oregon. The sorrowing parents, brothers and sisters have the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community.

Delinquent Taxes.

Under the new law for the collection of taxes, unpaid taxes become delinquent after the first Monday in October. The county courts have absolutely no jurisdiction in the premises, and do not have the right to extend for a day the time for the collection of any delinquent taxes. Under the old law regulating the collection of taxes, they became delinquent after April 1, but the county court had the authority to make such extension of the time in which to make the collections as was deemed proper. But the county court has no power to act in this relation under the new law, and taxes will become delinquent after the first Monday in October.

Additional Locals.

The business men of Burns, Harney county have sent in a petition against the proposed Forest Reserve in so far as it affects Harney county.

The city council has ordered all defective sidewalks repaired and that lights be kept burning all night where excavations in the street and other places may be dangerous.

Dr. Bloom, a dentist formerly of Joseph, and now of Wyoming, Herman Trippier and Rufus Eaton, of Cove, arrived in the city Wednesday enroute for a few days outing at the lake.

Wallie Snyder says that while out in the Mud Creek country with J. W. McAlister last week he shot at a deer with a 22 rifle and is satisfied he killed it because another person told him he found the carcass of a deer a few days later in that locality.

A beautiful wedding took place at Rev. L. Green's on the evening of Aug. 23. When Mr. C. L. Dickson, of Lovely, Ore., and Mrs. Louisa Clemons, of Elgin, were united in holy wedlock by Rev. Green. May happiness attend them throughout life.

The Indian War Veterans of Independence have passed a resolution asking our representatives in congress to pass a law granting them additional pay of \$2 per day for each man during the time he served in the Indian wars and \$2 per day for the services of his horse in addition to the pensions recently secured.

Elgin was visited by a furious storm Friday night. A lightning bolt struck the electric light plant, almost dismantled Dan Sommer's store building, and shattered the central telephone station. The most severe damage was done to the electric light plant, which was so badly injured that it cannot be operated until repairs are made and some of the machinery is replaced. It is stated that the town will be without electric lights for two weeks or more and the extent of the damage is estimated at a thousand dollars.

The passengers on the northbound train from Redding Thursday evening were treated to a rare sight. At Calumet spur a miner who had been in Redding alighted from the train. He climbed upon the trapeze car on the cable crossing the river and gave the signal to turn her loose. With lightning-like rapidity the car shot across to within fifty feet of the opposite station and stuck. Every car window was filled with heads watching the miner suspended in midair above the river. The car had stuck. The last passengers could see of him—he was still sitting on the stalled car. He hung there for hours before he could be rescued.
