Pack Horses Drowned.

Russell Stickney who has been tending sheep camp for Geo. Boney met with a serious experience last Saturday morning as he was coming through the high mountains southwest of Enterprise near the heads of the streams that flow both north and south. He had four pack horses tailed to each other and was leading them over the steep trails. As he was passing a short distance above a lake in that region the horses became tangled up and rolled off the trail into the lake. Stickney went in to try to rescue them and came near losing his life. Being tied together the horses were unable to save themselves and the four of them soon drowned. Mr. Stickney came out of the mountains very much discouraged with the idea of packing and it is reported swore off every attempting such a job again.

A Farmer's Trust.

The details concerning the Farmers Trust which has been organized at Pierre, S. D., with a capital of \$50,000,000 are just being made public. Under the plan of the concern no one but farmers will be allowed to own a share of stock. Branch offices are to be established all over the United States, the chief branch establishment to be in Chicago. All kinds of farm products are to be dealt in and handled on a commission basis or for cash, as circumstances may direct. Deals on the Chicago Board of Trade in cash grain are also contemplated, with the object of giving the farmer a chance of getting a better price for his product and at the same time shutting out the middle men. It is believed by eliminating the middle men and having the farmers of the country behind it, the organization can maintain a uniform price to the benefit of the farmer without injury to the consumer.

The Innaha Mine.

Dr. S. S. Bugbee, a mining expert of Tracy, Minn., returned on Wednesday's stage from an inspection of the copper ledges in the Innaha mining district. He was very favorably impressed with his observations and states that the assays made indicate that the ledges will outrival the famous Cripple Creek mines. The Dr. had some very rich specimens of ore with him.—Recorder.
