Waded to His Death.

SPRINGFIELD, ORE., Aug. 18.--A sad tragedy occurred above Jasper, two miles this side of A. D. Hylands at 2:30 p. m. Aug. 16, in which Frank Kirkland, a young man aged 21 years, lost his life by drowning.

The young man, with a crew of six helpers has been engaged for the past two weeks in conducting a drive of shingle bolts consigned to Springfield shingle mill, down the Willamette river. At the time of the accident Kirkland noticed that a number of the timbers were circling around in an eddy. He waded out to release them but got beyond his depth and was drawn into the whirlpool. His cries were heard by members of the crew who immediately manned a rowboat and went to his assistance. He had sunk to the bottom by this time and it required about 10 or 15 minutes time to locate the body and bring it to the surface. When this was finally accomplished heroic measures were employed to restore consciousness but without success.

Lester Vaughan brought the sad intelligence to Springfield. Jas. Clark, uncle of deceased and B. A. Washburne of that city started at once for the scene and returned with the body.

Parents of drowned man reside at Joseph, Eastern Oregon and a brother, Harry Kirkland, is a resident of Springfield. Deceased was a member of the Springfield camp Woodmen of the World and was unmarried.
