**FRUITA.**

On the early morning of the 29th ult chips in the woodyards were white with frost.

T. F. Rich is beginning to move his immense crop of fruit to outside markets.

Logan Galbreth drew his gun on Sam Keener recently. The trouble arising over a misunderstanding relative to a partnership placer claim.

Sheepmen are beginning to realize the fact that the future has in store for them trouble in finding ample summer range for their flocks.

Both sawmills are idle in this vicinity for want of logs on the mill yards.

The peach crop on the Upper Innaha will be very light not enough to meet home demand.

Roasting ears, bacon and beans are now on our daily dinner bill of fare with blackberries and huckleberries as dessert.

N. Johnson the hero of a hundred battles and many scars is erecting a turning lathe near the residence of L. G. Page. Mr. Johnson will not only manufacture turned wares but he will do a general cooperage business also.

A crew of volunteer laborers began work last Monday on the bridge to span the Innaha river, near the mouth of Freezeout creek. There will be two abutments and two piers. The center span of the bridge will be fifty feet long. The County Court generously appropriated \$175 with which to purchase material. The bridge when completed will contain no less than 15,000 feet of lumber including all woodwork. John A. Bleavens is supervising the work.

Farmers generally all over the Lower Valley are reporting good yields of grain.

C. T. McDaniel has purchased the U. R. Wilson residence property near the mill and moved into it Tuesday. Consideration \$1000.

**Bear Adventure.**

He revived at daylight and by aid of an improvised pair of crutches managed to take care of the sheep and himself until the camp tender arrived two days later when he was taken home, considerably disgusted with the life of a shepherd.
