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### WORLD'S NEWS.

#### FROM FAR AND NEAR.

Clipped and Copied From Our Exchanges.

Labor bodies of Montana will address a mammoth petition to President Roosevelt asking him to intercede in the great industrial struggle between the Pennsylvania magnates and their employes.

A new smelter company has just been organized in Denver with a capital stock of \$20,000,000.

English authorities in London took General Corbin and John W. Gates to task yesterday for running an automobile faster than the speed required by law.

E. F. Clark, the Port Gamble man who lost 65 twenty-dollar gold pieces on a ranch near Machias last week, thinks that his trick dog, which was with him at the time the money disappeared, carried away and buried the sack of gold pieces, which weighed four pounds.

The annual migration of Chinese to their native land has begun. The Empress of India, which sailed from Vancouver Monday, carried 750 Chinese and refused the applications of 150 others who desired to go.

Word has reached Vancouver that the cable steamship Colonia buoyed the Pacific cable one mile off Fanning Island Monday morning, having laid 3445 nautical miles between Vancouver and that point since September 18.

W. R. Hearst in accepting the Democratic nomination for Congress from the 11th district, yesterday, said that he was in favor of Government ownership of certain things, such as railroads and telegraph.

In a speech from a balcony of his hotel, at Brussels, yesterday, General Dewee reiterated that they had not come to Europe to seek vain succor to regain their independence, but to obtain help in repairing the ravages of the war.

At Grand Rapids, Mich., yesterday, four of the most prominent officials and citizens of Lake County and D. H. Miller, of Chicago, were arraigned on a charge of running a lottery and promoting it through the fraudulent use of the mails.

A dispatch from Manila yesterday states that General Summer-in command of the American forces on Mindanao Island, has sent an ultimatum to the Sultan of Bacolod, promising him the same treatment received by the Moros if he did not give in at once.

A decision rendered by Judge Tuley yesterday in Chicago, in a suit instituted by the Illinois Manufacturers' Association, may, it is estimated, cost the Chicago Telephone Company more than \$1,000,000, unless the Supreme Court reverses the judgment of Judge Tuley.

The demand for eggs is so great in Baker City that several carloads of Eastern eggs have to be shipped into that city every year.

The apple crop of Oregon last season was 850,000 boxes of fresh and 150,000 pounds of dried fruit. The crop this year will be considerably larger, though the price realized will be less.

Collections of the 1901 tax of Clackamas County were completed Monday, and the books closed as required by law. Out of a total tax of \$169,779.20 there has been collected \$162,900, leaving about \$7000 delinquent.

Gideon Steiner, a well-known fish dealer of Salem, wants the next Legislature to repeal the law, which creates a close season for catching black bass. He says the fish are plentiful enough now, so that they will not be exterminated even if the people are permitted to take them at all seasons of the year.

### The Lewis & Clark Fair.

The Oregonian has secured a statement from all of the members of the next legislature on the proposed appropriation to be made when the law makers meet next winter. The following is the opinion sent in by Representative Burleigh of Wallowa and Union counties:

Enterprise, Oct. 5.—(To the Editor:—I am not sufficiently advised at present of the intentions and purposes of the Board of Directors to express a decided opinion as to what action the Legislature should take in the matter. Speaking in a general way, if the fair is to be of sufficient importance to secure an appropriation from Congress, and from the states generally, I should favor an appropriation of a sufficient amount to erect a suitable state building, large enough to accommodate each county in making a county exhibit. That would arouse a local pride in each county and secure a county appropriation sufficiently large to make the best exhibit possible; and when you get the best possible exhibit from each county in this state you have a great show within itself.

I should think a special levy of 1 mill added to the state tax would produce ample revenue for the purpose. I am of the opinion the Fair can be made a greater success by not depending altogether upon large appropriations and not attempting too much, but by making a practical use of each dollar of smaller appropriations.

In the meantime Portland and the Board of Directors should take steps to arouse a greater interest and enthusiasm in the Fair throughout the state. Secure not only the support of the members of the Legislature but the enthusiastic support of the men and women who have to pay the state and county appropriations.
