A good road to the mines on lower Innaba is an absolute necessity for the immediate future. It will open up a new market for almost everything produced by Wallowa county. The miners led the road and the people of the county need it.

The coal miner's strike in the eastern states is becoming a very serious affair. Winter is coming on and the price of coal is now three times the ordinary price and unless the strike is settled the shortage will be still greater and the price still higher. Thousands of families will suffer from cold this winter because of the inability to purchase fuel. A unique comment on the situation is made by the Saturday Evening Post when it says that the coal famine will effect the matrimonial market. The fathers will not allow the fire to burn in the parlor at any and all times of night and further that many young men will shrink from the possibility of having to foot the coal bills at \$20 per ton should they carry out their matrimonial intentions.

### Mines are Made, not Found.

Very few people, as a general thing have but a vague conception of what constitutes a mine. Many hold to the idea that a mine is found when a ledge or surface cropping is discovered; and, if they are interested in any way in the new discovery, they expect dividends at once, and condemn mining in all its branches if the property is not remunerative within a few months after work has begun on its development. To all such the Mining Review would say: "Have nothing at all to do with mining, as you are doomed to disappointment." The man who expects dividends from a prospect after it has been worked for a few months out of his class, and had better devote his time to digging potatoes or measuring calves, as mines are made after the prospect is found, and it often takes four or five years of steady work and extensive development before a prospect can be rated as a producing and paying mine, no matter how rich and strong the veins may be at the surface.—Salt Lake Mining Review.

### To Punish Brutes.

An idea that is worth following out is credited to Seattle's humane society. It is nothing less than requesting the state legislature to pass a law that will serve to provide for wives and children who are left to the uncertain care of drunken and worthless fathers. It is proposed that such parents shall be compelled to labor on public works and the earnings turned over to their families. Such a law, it is claimed, exists in Indiana and Ohio and in each state it is said to work well.

The man who deceives another by persuading him to cash a worthless check may be severely punished; but the fellow who, by false promises, persuades a woman to marry him can vindict her out of years of happiness without any fear of the law—can abandon her,

leave her sick and helpless with a wailing infant in her hands and not a cent of money in her pocket and go where he pleases unpunished and unrebuked.

The citizen who kicks a dog cruelly can be brought before the court and fined for his meanness; what can you do with the brute who lets his own children go ragged, dirty and hungry while he loaf around the saloons?

Isn't it time for some one to call for a change?

### Jay Dobbin's Success.

"There are plenty of opportunities left in Oregon for young men," said Jay H. Dobbin, a Wallowa sheepman, at the woolgrowers' meeting. "In the fall of '97 I went into Wallowa county with 1300 head of sheep. I owed for the winter. With four cayuses and a couple of dogs I went down on Snake river, where the winter range was good, tended my own camp, herded my own sheep, and worried along through the first winter, by close attention to business, with no loss. My first clip of wool and flock of lambs paid for the sheep and left me my own boss, at least. This spring I raised 7000 lambs and cut about 300 tons of hay on my land. It takes nerve, but a man can cultivate that."—B. W. Huffman in East Oregonian.

### PULLMAN ORDINARY SLEEPERS.

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.
