WORLD'S NEWS.

FROM FAR AND NEAR.

Clipped and Copied From Our Exchanges.

The Klondike's output for this year is estimated at \$12,000,000. The total shipped to date from Dawson is given \$10,255,000.

The work of taking eggs on the Columbia River by the United States Fish Commission has ceased for the season. At the four stations over 20,000,000 eggs were taken.

The total tax levy at Spokane for the ensuing year, including city, county and state, will be 34 mills, or a reduction of 1 mill as compared with the present levy.

The yield of corn in the fields around Athena will be from 25 to 35 bushels per acre. Corn is a paying crop in Umatilla County, and the acreage is increasing each year.

Another sensation is looked for in the St. Louis hoodie cases. It has been intimated that the sheriff or his deputies have been aiding the hoodlers to delay the prosecution.

It has been discovered that under the new initiative and referendum amendment no act of the Legislature can go into effect for 90 days after the close of the session. This applies also to appropriations.

The Supreme Court of Idaho holds the act of 1889 relative to the carrying of concealed weapons to be unconstitutional on the ground that it was in conflict with the state and federal constitutions declaring the right of citizens to bear arms shall not be abridged. The Court decided, however, that the Legislature has a right to pass a law regulating the method of carrying weapons.

There has been an alarming spread of smallpox in Walla Walla during the last few weeks. Eight cases are now at the pest house west of the city and over a dozen persons are quarantined within the municipal limits.

An active campaign will likely be instituted against the practice of transporting logs to San Francisco in the form of huge rafts. It is considered dangerous and masters and pilots will petition congress to enact legislation forbidding it.

In the United States Court at Spokane, Tuesday, Judge C. H. Hanford issued a permanent injunction forbidding certain members of the Cooks and Waiters' Union or their associates to interfere with the restaurant business conducted by K. Takahashi, a Japanese.

A dispatch from Washington yesterday said that the crisis was near at hand in Venezuela and that it was not at all improbable that Minister Bowen will in the near future be confronted with the necessity of recognizing either the Matos or the Castro Government.

A report was given out in Havana yesterday by business men who had been called in to consult with President Palma, that Cuba will accept the treaty with America.

General Brue-Brown, pastor of the Christian church in Denver, was asked to resign his position yesterday at the session of the Christian church convention, now in session at Omaha. He is charged with sensationalism.

It is estimated that the world's output of coal for 1901 was \$66,165,140 short tons, with the United States in the lead.

The mine owners and operators of the Baker City district have organized for the purpose of securing a change in the recent order of the Secretary of the Interior creating the Eastern Oregon forest reserve. A meeting was held and it was resolved to invite Senator Mitchell to visit Baker City and look into the condition of affairs.

A shepherd who owns a band of 2500 sheep met with an accident out in the hills near Baker City, last week

and before he was able to secure assistance 1000 of his sheep strayed away and have been lost, so far as he is concerned.

Up to the time the shifts changed Tuesday morning the sugar factory at LaGrande had cut 2400 tons of beets and had sacked 4827 bags of sugar.

Wm. Banton and L. W. Drumb-smith, of Union county, were taken suddenly ill with symptoms of narcotic poisoning. A physician was summoned, who administered remedies, and the men were soon out of danger. They were feeding a threshing machine, and it is thought that larkspur in the barley caused the trouble.

Already 1000 head of sheep and 350 head of cattle are booked at the LaGrande Sugar Factory, to be fattened on pulp. As the virtues of this food becomes more generally known its great advantages will be utilized. It is cheap food, very rich in fat producing properties and fully equal to any ensilage made.

A. Miller, the cattle rustler who blew his brains out when surrounded by a sheriff's posse near Pomeroy, last week, to avoid arrest, was an old Oregon stockman and had followed cattle all his life. Miller came across the plains in the '50s.

The Hotel to be a Winner.

The big stone hotel in Enterprise will be a winner and paying investment from the start. It could not have been started at a more propitious time, while everybody recognized the need of it long years ago. The prospects are now that it will not be large enough to accommodate the patronage it will receive from the first day it is open. The rush to the copper mines on Lower Imnaha and the gold mines on the head of Imnaha will be on and Enterprise will be the outfitting point and stopping place for all going and coming. In the second place there will be more building going on in town next year than ever before and will require more men who must eat and sleep at the hotel. The company was fortunate in undertaking the erection of the hotel and the man who leases it will also be fortunate.

Woodmen Log Rolling.

The Woodmen of the World are arranging for a monstrous log rolling initiation meeting at Elgin on November 18 and 19. It is practically assured that 200 candidates will be initiated into the mysteries of wood craft on that occasion and Enterprise Camp No. 535 will furnish a large share of that number. The members are rusting and have been assisted by deputy supreme commander Derrick. Thirty candidates have already been secured by Enterprise camp and they have only fairly begun. Enterprise camp has by far the largest membership of any lodge in the county. It now has sixty-five members and fully expects to increase it during the next month to double that number. Every neighbor has his coat off and is "sawing wood."

Woodmen Social.

The Woodmen of the World gave a very pleasant social in the hall last Monday evening, after which a lunch of coffee and sandwiches was served in the court room. The program consisted of a vocal solo by Mrs. C. H. Zurcher, recitations by Mrs. J. F. Bater and Leo Forsythe and a thirty minute talk by D. C. Derrick a district organizer for the Woodmen of the World.
