We, your Grand Jury duly empanelled for the October term of said court, beg leave to submit this our final report and respectfully ask to be discharged from further attendance.

We find that the people of Wallowa County are so prosperous, happy and law abiding, that they seem to have no disposition to commit crime. Therefore we have returned into court no indictments whatever, and upon which fact we congratulate the taxpayers of Wallowa County and recommend the further continuance on the part of the people in the straight and narrow path of rectitude and righteousness.

We further find the financial condition of the county to be first class.

We further find that the water closet connected with the county jail is in a very unhealthy condition and recommend that the County Court take immediate steps to put city water therein and build and construct a suitable cesspool properly covered, protected and ventilated.

We further and the back stairs leading from the court house building to be in a shaky and unsafe condition and recommend their immediate repair.

We further recommend that the County Court immediately purchase a good comfortable office chair for the use of the Circuit Judge while presiding over Court in this county.

We find the various county offices apparently kept in a good orderly and business like condition.

PULLMAN ORDINARY SLEEPERS.

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Company has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same equipment. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, shoes, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, comb, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a store for making tea and coffee and doing "light housekeeping," and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths, keep the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passenger. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers." The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.

Much of the first class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.
