#### A Big Month

The month of October was a busy one in the Clerks office of this county, in fact the work and receipts were the largest of any month in the history of the county.

257 instruments, including deeds, mortgages and mining notices were recorded, which brought in as fees \$258.45. To this may also be added \$11.25 as fees for marriage licenses and \$44 as circuit court fees, making the total receipts of the office for the month amount to \$313.70. In addition to the work entailed in the recording and keeping the accounts of the county, there was a session of the county court, a session of circuit court, the board of equalization and the extending of the delinquent tax roll. Three men have been "up to their ears" in work in this office during almost the entire month, and the receipts have been such as to almost pay the salaries of all the county officers for the month.

It is becoming evident that a provision must be made for the election of a county recorder or that provision must be made for more help in the Clerk's office. A county officer earn every cent of the salary allowed him and should not be compelled to divide it with deputies he must hire to keep up with the work.
