Important Land Decisions.

Astoria, October 13.—Judge McBride convened an adjourned session of the circuit court this afternoon and handed down a number of formal orders. The most important of these was in the case of C. L. Houston and J. E. Ferguson vs. George Kaboth, in which a judgment was given the plaintiff, and the defendant was allowed 60 days in which to file a bill of exceptions. This suit was brought to set aside a deed to a lot in the business portion of the city, given by the county to the defendant, who had purchased it at the recent sale of property held by the county for taxes. In giving his decision the court said that no affidavit was on file showing that the sheriff had made any attempt to levy on the personal property owned by the holder of the real estate in question, as is required by law, before selling the lot for taxes, and therefore the original sale of the property to the county was void. The court also held that while the sale to the defendant had been made under a special act of the legislature, he did not believe the legislature had authority to pass a law correcting errors of this kind, and as the first sale of the property was void the second sale was also void. This decision is of considerable interest to the public, as it will invalidate a large number of deeds secured at what is known as the "dead horse" tax sale.
