The County Fair.

The first effort of the people of Wallowa County to hold a County Fair has proved a remarkable success. So much so that the County fair will be an annual event hereafter.

On Sunday the exhibits commenced to arrive and Monday and Tuesday were taken up in placing them and then the managers found that the space allotted was not sufficient.

On Wednesday the Fair opened with about 1500 people in attendance.

Dr. Whitecomb and Profs. Kent and Cosley of the Oregon Agricultural College were present and after delivering a series of lectures awarded prizes on live stock exhibited. The number of head of live stock was not as great as anticipated but the quality was A 1.

The exhibition of fruit, grain, vegetables and grasses was great in amount and of the very finest quality, and every section of the county was represented.

The crowd was sorely disappointed in the balloon ascension. In filling the balloon and just at the time it was to arise the entire structure burst into flames and was quickly consumed. Mr. Hurtubise immediately telegraphed for another one but was not able to get it here in time for the fair.

On Wednesday night was the Fiddler Contest and the following prizes were awarded:

First \$25.00, A. Wilson of Smith Mountain; Second, \$20.00, J. B. Haskins of Paradise; Third, \$15.00, C. L. Cole of Lost Prairie; Fourth, \$10.00, Jap. Stubbfield; Fifth, \$5.00, T. O. Barnwell of Enterprise. The Enterprise Dramatic Co. gave performances every night to crowded houses.

On Thursday the rain greatly interfered with the program.

Wednesday—1/4 mile, saddle horse race—McDonald's horse 1st. Warnock's horse 2nd.

In the race Friday—1/4 mile, free for all—Dan Warnock's mare 1st. Wolf's mare 2nd.
