**START**

Graduate from high school. Move ahead 3 spaces.

A bus driver tells you to sit at the back of the bus. You refuse and are arrested. GO TO JAIL.

Register black people to vote. Move ahead 1 space.

You are arrested for leading a peaceful march. Go to JAIL.

Make a speech. Move ahead 1 space.

Go to college and become a minister. Move ahead 3 spaces.

Go to Washington, D.C., to lead 250,000 people in a march for equality. Roll again.

Get a letter threatening your life. Go back 3 spaces.

A bomb goes off on your porch. Lose a turn.

Convince thousands of people to stop riding buses until blacks are treated equally on buses. Move ahead 1 space.

1964-The Civil Rights Act gives black people equal rights under the law. Move ahead 1 space.

Police attack civil rights marchers. Go back 1 space.

1956 - People stop riding buses in Montgomery, Alabama, for one year. The U.S. Supreme Court declares it illegal to treat blacks differently on a bus. Move ahead 1 space.

Win the Nobel Prize for Peace. Move ahead 1 space.

Black voters are harassed when they try to vote. Lose a turn.

Congress passes the Voting Rights Act of 1965. Roll again.

### HOW TO PLAY FREEDOM FIGHTER:

1. Taking turns, roll the die. Move ahead the number of spaces shown.

## Justice for All



Imagine that one day your teacher said only kids with freckles could sit at desks and be first in line. Would this be fair? Your teacher would not be treating all students equally.

For many years, black Americans were treated differently from white Americans. Black children could not attend the same schools or use the same drinking fountains that white children used.

In the 1950s and 60s, thousands of Americans worked together to change these unfair laws. One of the leaders of this movement was a dedicated minister named Martin Luther King, Jr. Each year we celebrate his birthday and remember the struggles and sacrifices he made so that the United States of America truly could be a land of equal opportunity for all.

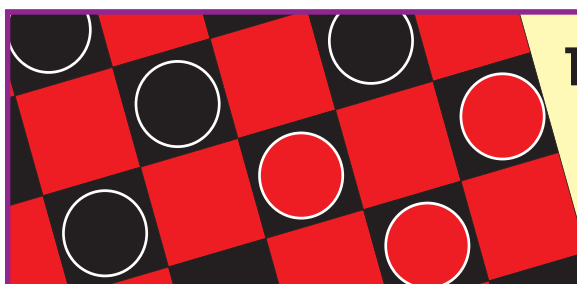
