Weather disrupts highway traffic

Traffic is once again being allowed through the section of Highway 101 just north of Sea Lion Caves at milepost 177 after the road was closed Dec. 20 due to water erosion dropping a section of the northbound lane by more than a foot. The weekend's heavy rains combined with high tides also caused the Siuslaw River to exceed flood stage and overflow its banks around Mapleton and along Highway 126 at Cushman. ODOT closed that highway for several hours on Dec. 21.
