Mapleton pool may get new lease on life

Members of the Siuslaw Regional Aquatic Center (SRAC) will propose that the Mapleton School District allow them to raise money to repair and reopen the pool located on school district property during tonight's Mapleton School Board meeting.

The SRAC board has already paid for initial engineering to determine what needs to be done to bring the pool up to current compliance standards.

The SRAC took over operations of the pool in 2006, when government funding to operate the pool was lost due to budget cuts. The Mapleton School Board agreed to lease the pool facilities to SRAC for \$1 per year in exchange for SRAC taking over the responsibility for maintenance and operation of the pool facility.

SRAC operated the pool facility until funds ran out in

Lauren Hesse, acting president of SRAC, said, "Within a month of closing the pool all the water had drained out, on its own. We realized there must be some repairs that were needed.

"We already knew that, by law, there needed to be an upgrading of the two drains in the bottom of the pool. In the process of the drain work, concerns arose over the pipes and vein-like cracks, which had previously been filled but the fillings didn't hold.

"This led to the question of whether there was a gap under the pool caused by the water seeping out through the cracks. No gaps were found. Nor was any pipe leakage discovered."

SRAC received an estimate of approximately \$100,000 to seal the pool and repair degraded surface edges of the pool.

"The next question was the pool equipment," according to Hesse. "Pumps, heaters and dehumidifiers needed upgrading, because only

The money to cover the cost of the engineering studies came from fundraising and grants. The Three Rivers Confederated Tribes gave SRAC a grant to cover most of the cost of the engineer's survey report. An SRAC board member also made a large

donation. According to the engineer's survey report, the total cost to bring the pool up to code, including sealing the cracks, was approximately \$600,000.

"I've called Pacific Source," Hesse said. "They said they would support wellness programs. They said they won't build a pool, but they would support an aqua therapy program. They can provide funds for that.

"The big hurdle is acquiring the \$600,000 to bring the pool and building up to current code standards."

The SRAC board plans to do some major fundraising and convince charitable foundations like the Ford Family Foundation, the Meyer Foundation and the Community Oregon Foundation to provide matching fund grants.

O'Mara said Mapleton School District supports the efforts of SRAC.

"That is one of the reasons for the meeting tonight," she said, "so that SRAC people can come and present to the school board the proposals that they would like to go forward with."

On Friday, Jan. 9, members of the community, SRAC board members and school board members compiled a list of potential uses for the pool facility. In addition to the pool they include a wellness center for visiting medical professionals; a resource/community center; space for rehab/physical therapy, including water therapy in the pool; a visitor's center; a large meeting space; an indoor play space for students during and after school; an indoor walking space; and a place for people to exercise, use weights, treadmills, etc.

"As a district we realize that we cannot have a pool by ourselves," O'Mara said.

"We can't fund it. It is fiscally irresponsible for us to even think that we could. Our economic base is lower than it has been in the past. While we do own the facilities and the property, we

Tom Paxton headlines Winter Folk Festival

13th annual music fest starts Saturday morning and runs through the weekend.

Tom Paxton will headline the 2015 Winter Folk Festival on Saturday, Jan. 17, at 7:30 p.m. at the Florence Events Center. There also will be eight other performers during the day on Saturday and Sunday, Jan. 18, in addition to the annual Artisan Craft Fair and amateur piebaking contest and sale.

Paxton has become a voice of his generation, addressing issues of injustice and inhumanity, laying bare the absurdities of modern culture and celebrating the tenderest bonds of family, friends and community.

In describing Paxton's influence on his fellow musicians, Pete Seeger said, "Tom's songs have a way of sneaking up on you. You find yourself humming them, whistling them, and singing a verse to a friend. Like the songs of Woody Guthrie, they're becoming part of America."

Paxton has been an integral part of the songwriting and folk music community since the early 1960s Greenwich Village scene, and continues to be a primary influence on today's "New Folk" performers.

U.S. Attorney may take over pipe bomb case

The Florence Police Department (FPD) has announced that the case concerning pipe bombs found in this area late last year may be turned over to federal authorities. The case is currently under investigation by the Portland Police Bureau and the FPD is cooperating in the effort.

In September 2014, a woman discovered a pipe bomb on 22nd Street near Highway 101, which she turned over to police.

Two months later, a pipe bomb exploded near the same area. No one was injured, and no damage was reported in either incident.

An FPD detective learned of other pipe bomb incidents that might have been
